FAX 1100 First Aid (Standard)
 The standard course of First Aid must have a minimum of 16 hours of formal theory and practical sessions, after which a written and practical test is taken. Each participant must satisfy a St. John Ambulance Examiner that he or she is capable of handling any given emergency situation. This is a more intensive first aid training than that in the "Emergency First Aid Course" and is required by the Workmen's Compensation Board for First Aiders in companies with more than five employees. Others trained to the Standard level include policemen, firefighters, school teachers, playground supervisors, first year nursing and medical students, as well as the general public. 6 sessions of 2 1/2 hours
