There was no room for oddballs in schools when Gloria Browne was a student - but times have changed. This fall, the 50-year-old selfstyled "middle-aged drop in" is back in the classroom along with grade 12 pupils in Spectrum school

Gloria isn't planning on a future career when she graduates - the mother of five and with three grandchildren just loves "learning and living" and she wants to finish what she started when she dropped out of grade 10 more than 30 years ago.

She's always had that nagging feeling that she's been robbed of everything, that she's missed out some-

Spectrum has had mature students return to school but Gloria is the first to seek proper graduation, says principal Wally Russell.

He boggled when he Acton received her application for enrolment. "Her qualifications and background were such that I began to wonder if we shouldn't try to fit her into the faculty."

Gloria certainly didn't waste her time during those years when she was raising a family. A glutton for study, she managed to sandwich a number of night school classes into those busy years the trip to Moncton.




McIntyre and Lucy Denny are back now from their holiday trip to the west coast.
