Gloria Browne is now middle-aged drop-in

Many people here will remember Gloria Browne, a talented lady who lived here several years ago before moving west. The Victorian, a B.C. publication, recently carried this story about Gloria which will be of interest to her friends here.

There was no room for oddballs in schools when Gloria Browne was a student — but times have changed. This fall, the 50-year-old self-styled "middle-aged drop-in" is back in the classroom along with grade 12 pupils in Spectrum school.

Gloria isn't planning on a future career when she graduates — the mother of five and with three grandchildren just loves "learning and living" and she wants to finish what she started when she dropped out of grade 10 more than 30 years ago.

She's never had that nagging feeling that she's been robbed of everything, that she's missed out somewhere.

Spectrum has had mature students return to school but Gloria is the first to seek proper graduation, says principal Wally Russell.

He hogged when he received her application for enrolment. "Her qualifications and background were such that I began to wonder if we shouldn't try to fit her into the faculty."

Gloria certainly didn't waste her time during those years when she was raising a family. A glutton for study, she managed to sandwich a number of night school classes into those busy years

— typing, drafting, carpentry, sewing, drawing and sketching, new math for parents, advertising and marketing are just a few of the things she did to satisfy her thirst for knowledge.

And now her children are grown up and have left home she finds there is a gap that needs filling. "You can't just stop and cry when the children are gone — you've got to go on," she says.

The students she rubs shoulders with at school have given her only cool welcome, but Gloria, who senses the slight discomfort of her classmates, understands. "I'm not going to invade their private young world," she says. "I'll put feelers out and if they want to respond maybe we can learn something from each other."

She's grateful to Spectrum for supplying her with the kind of learning environment she feels she needed in her youth but never found.

Two of her children were former students at Spectrum and she often attended school

meetings. "The concept sounded so exciting and I thought this was the school

for me if I ever decided to go back."

Her children and husband greeted the news of her return to school almost with indifference. "I've always done so many things the kids just accept it, and my husband understands because he knows I have to do something

to keep my mind occupied."

That she'll certainly be doing. As well as taking Algebra, Physics II, Applied Design and Photography and Radio and Television Communications, Gloria — "I read quite a lot" — manages to gobble up more than 300 books a year.
