# Municipal complex is it being reborn?

Is the idea of a municipal complex being reborn? An expansion of the Trafalgar Road municipal building in

 two phases has been suggested. Monday Halton Hills council approved a building committee recommendation that architect Don Hallford attend a special meeting October 18 to show his drawings for an ex-

panded municipal administration building. The cost was estimated at nearly \$1 million. Hallford met with the building committee, which is examining town space needs on September 20 and showed preliminary drawings for the addition to the Seventh Line building. The drawings which included a new council chambers, offices, landscaping and refurbishing of the

existing building were done in 1976 before a public outcry over the Idea. At the meeting the committee reviewed the floor plans and decided first consideration should be given to properly

housing, planning and engineering departments. The idea of constructing Hallford's expansion plan in two phases was discussed and deemed "economically feasible". When Hallford comes to council, department heads will also be present to discuss with council the need for "im-

proved municipal office space". The cost of bringing Hallford to council isn't to exceed \$50. Councillor Peter Pomeroy said the committee, which hasn't even elected a chairman, was three or four steps ahead of itself in bringing Hallford to council. He said the committee needs terms of reference and should complete a lot of other work before examining plans,

Mayor Tom Hill said Hallford was being brought to council so new councillors can see his plans. "\$50 isn't that much when compared with what we throw around here for other things."

Councillor Roy Booth noted there haven't been enough members of the building committee meetings to elect a chairman. He has been serving as interim chairman until one is elected. He said the special council meeting will give council a chance to establish space needs and give the committee direction.

The old building committee, which brought Hallford's plans to council "took a lot of shots". Councillor Mike Armstrong said "but at least it did something."

Hill emphasized the meeting was being called only so questions could be answered. He noted the committee is being "shoved" by staff to provide more space but if council doesn't want the building all it has to do is say so.

Armstrong said building committee should decide about a "municipal complex" for itself and then send its recommendations to council instead "buck passing" and dumping the issue in council's lap.

Four representatives of the Actonlans for Action committee met for two hours Monday morning with George Ash, parliamentary assistant to provincial treasurer Darcy McKeough, in Toronto.

Committee chairman Peter Papillon, Norm Elliott, Aldo Braida and Dave Swetman presented their petition with the signatures of over 2,000 people who requested a review of regional govern-

## Teams that can't pay shouldn't use rink

Raiders and Sabres who don't pay their ice rental bills shouldn't be allowed to use the rink the following year councillor Marilyn Serjeantson told Halton Hills council Monday. Her suggestion was rejected by council.

She called for the financial status of the two Junior B and one Intermediate clubs to be assessed in May. She said if a team owed outstanding debt to the town or if an existing debt hasn't been substantially reduced "the club shouldn't be allowed to use the arena next winter.'

Serjeantson made suggestion after financeadministration committee recommendation reducing ice rates and hall rental fees.

Councillor Peter Pomeroy, who was opposed to Serjeantson's motion, called it "dynamite". He sald it would permanently drive the financially struggling teams out of business.

Mayor Tom Hill, who supported the Idea, noted one team, Geminis owes the town money now and if they get deeper into debt it won't matter because they won't be able to pay off "until hell freezes over.
