Halton. The Regional Community and Social Services Committee reviewed the first batch of budget estimates from the Department of Social and Family Services at its Sept. 27 meeting. These estimates concerned the areas of general welfare assistance

and special services. A decision on projected staff salary increases for welfare services staff was deferred pending further information on Anti-Inflation Board (AIB) guidelines.

The 1978 budget for general welfare assistance services, excluding staff salaries, was projected at \$1,285,300, of which 80 per cent is subsidized by the province. This compares to \$1,270,985 budgeted for the same services in 1977.

The committee also agreed to recommend to regional council that the provincial subsidy for homemaker services be increased to 100 per cent from 80 per cent.

At the same meeting the committee heard a delegation from Burlington's Joseph Brant Hospital in camera. Oakville councillor Laurie Mannell protested that the discussion should ' and refused to attend me incamera session.

Code of practice
