Foodland symbol

Agriculture and Food Minister Bill Newman has released the design of the symbol which will highlight the ministry's food promotion campaign, Foodland Ontario.

The symbol, which incorporates the words "Foodland Ontario" and the stylized trillium, represents growth and the productivity of Ontario's agricultural land. It will be used extensively in the ministry's media advertising program scheduled to begin in early November.

The minister, speaking just prior to leaving on a food expert mission to Japan, said that many marketing boards, commodity groups and retailers have also expressed interest in using the symbol. "I hope to see it widely displayed in the coming months, particularly on food packages and con-

tainers," he said. The symbol will be the centrepiece of the ministry's "Ontario Food Festival" at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in November.

The minister also said that provincial assistance is available for commodity group promotions. Under this shared cost promotion program, participating commodity groups will develop and carry out promotion campaigns with

the ministry providing financial assistance: Mr. Newman said the major portion of the campaign will be direct media advertising to the consumer. "We want all consumers in the province to participate in the future of agriculture in Ontario by increasing their consumption of

Judge Sharpe said that under the current situation at the old court house on Brown St. in Milton one of the three provincial court judges, John Robinson, can only sit during three days of the week.

Judge Sharpe added that it's difficult to handle cases that require long preliminaries, because there are no courts available.

Besides easing the overcrowding situation, Judge Sharpe said the new facilities will be an improvement over the older court house.

When the new facilities are finished the Milton court house along with the Georgetown court house will be shut

Judge Sharpe said this was a move to have the courts in one location. The provincial building currently houses the

In addition Judge Sharpe said new facilities are also being looked at for the Burlington court house.

The addition to the provincial building will double the existing space in the two storey building. The first floor will increase the space for the land registry facilities of the Ministry of Consumer and Commercial Relations.

The second floor will house two provincial criminal division courtrooms, judges' quarters, interview rooms, public areas and administration offices for the Ministry of the Attorney General.

The basement will consist of holding facilities for prisoners awaiting trial as well as storago and building service areas.

The cost of the entire expansion is \$2,059,853.

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
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
