Harris, Harper, Patterson herds top performance

Results of the 65 dairy herds in Halton who are enrolled on Record of Performance have recently been announced.

Contest for beef

United Breeders Inc. has competition in four parts, designed as a test of intelligence, self expression, showmanship and knowledge. The 4-H Beef Silver Dollar Competition, as it will be known, is scheduled for 1978 and will be open to senior 4-H members in the 15 southern Ontario counties serviced by the breeding unit. The silver dollar reference is to the prizes—75 silver dollars offered for the grand champion, 50 to the reserve champion, 25 for honorable mention, all on engraved silver trays.

Winners of the four divisions will also receive 25 silver dollars... for the best answered senior level quiz, for the best essay on a challenging topic of beef interest for best showman and for best calf.

This competition parallels an already existing program sponsored by United Breeders, which each year brings together top Dairy 4-H'ers from Central and Mid-western Ontario. The beef 4-H Silver Dollar Competition is unique in being centered around a heifer calf project. Most existing senior beef competitions are steer shows.

The winner in the Holstein section with 55 Holstein herds enrolled was Burnview Farms Ltd., the farm of Murray Harris, R. R. 6, Milton. His 22 cows averaged 8,894 kg of milk, 325 kg of fat, 3.65 per cent test for Breed Class Averages of 175 for milk and 178 for fat.

This production would be the equivalent of approximately 19,567 lbs. of milk and 715 lbs. of butterfat and is the highest composite BCA ever achieved in Halton. Last year, Burnview Farms Ltd. was runner-up in Halton with BCAs of 169 for milk and 169 for fat.

Runner-up in 1976 for Holsteins was Claude F. Pickett, H. R. 2, Georgetown with 25 cows averaging 7,154 kg of milk, 267 kg of fat, 3.95 per cent test for BCAs of 149 for milk and 159 for fat.

Fourth was Fred Nurse, R. R. 2, Georgetown with 31 cows averaging 6,980 kg of milk, 267 kg of fat, 3.82 per cent test for BCAs of 150 for milk and 156 for fat. W. J. Proud, 3369 Burnhamthorpe Rd., Oakville was fifth with 19 cows averaging 7,322 kg of milk, 278 kg of fat, 3.79 per cent test for BCAs of 146 for

and 152 for fat. The top producing Jersey Herd in Halton was owned by Mrs. S. L. Eva Harper, R. R. 3, Georgetown with 28 records averaging 146 BCAs for milk and 138 for fat. The high producing Guernsey herd was from the farm of Alton Gunby, R. R. 1, Burlington with 26 records, 166 BCAs for milk and 166 for fat. In the Dual-Purpose Short-horn section the winner was Harold Patterson, R. R. 1, Milton with 18 records averaging 168 BCAs for milk and 166 for fat. Halton has the highest percentage of dairy herds on milk testing of any county or region in the province.
