The first meeting of the Rock-a-long Homemaking Club Project "Featuring Fruit" was held on Saturday, October 8 at the home of Mrs. McDuffe.

The 4-H club projects are sponsored by Women's Institutes across Ontario, and the Rock-a-long 4-H Homemaking club is lucky enough to be sponsored by the Rock-a-long W.I. of Wellington County.

The two ladies for the Featuring Fruit club projects are Mrs. Jean McDuffe and Miss Helen Bayne. Twelve members were present, with one visitor and at least five more girls expected to join the club. The Featuring Fruit project concerns different ways to serve fruit in our diet (such as juices, cooking, fresh, etc.) We will learn how to make pies, punch, cookies, and so on from fresh, frozen or dried fruits. We will also learn the different varieties of each fruit, nutritional value, etc.

At our meeting, we repeated the 4-H pledge, and received our members pamphlets and supplementary sheets concerning the project. Election of officers then followed with Mary Hindley again being elected as president, Evelyn Eason as vice-president, and Helen Hindley as secretary. Elaine Donnell was elected as press-reporter and Shelley Spencer and Evelyn Eason as telephonists.

We then deliberated our club name and after many suggestions, "The Fruitti
