The Acton pumphouse is rated to pump one million gallons of water per day, at its maximum. The high capacity is a safety margin in case the need should ever arise for huge amounts of water, as it would for a big fire in sum-

According to Mr. Lokun, there is no possibility of water freezing in the pumphouse. "The building is designed to take care of any problem. Basically, we've got heat in

If there should be any conchlorinate. We don't anticipate any problem," he added.
