Rev. Gerald Danford from Barrie Hill spoke Sunday. His topic was Every Christian a Missionary. If a child is about to rush out into traffic, ordinary people rise to the occasion and rush to rescue him. But where spiritual things are concerned, people stand on the curb. The old prayer is often what people have in mind, Bless me and my wife, my son John and his wife, we four and no more.

The Christian church is not accomplishing the things it should. Each of us can become better missionaries. No matter how old or sick a person is, he can pray for individuals, for the church at large and for spreading the gospel. We can become better missionaries by how we live. Paul refers to living letters; our actions speak more than

our words. We can attract or repel by our lives. Let us not be missionaries in reverse.

We can bear witness to the good news of Christ. We do not need to fear; we can conquer the world.

Another way is by our giving. The church has barely kept pace with inflation. We must spur on to do more than we have. The church is a minority. There is constant need for more ministers. In 1973, there were 50 ordinands and 100 pastoral charges in need of a minister. Young people should give serious thought to going into the ordained ministry, or taking an active part in other ways.

Surely the love we have for God will make us try to spread His love in the world.
