Minor bants undefeated W-W record now at 2-0

Acton minor bantams got their W-W schedule off to a good start as they shut out visiting Waterloo 1-0 Wednesday night in the arena. The game was scoreless until the last minute of play, when assistant captain Rick

Smith broke through unassisted. The lone goal stood for the final minute giving Acton the win. There were only two penalties handed out in the game, both to the Waterloo squad.
