Home renewal loans cited

The attention of all Rockwood property owners is drawn to the Ontario Home Renewal Program, sponsored by the Ministry of Housing, Province of Ontario, and administered by the clerk treasurer, township of Eramosa.

Len Hockey explains that this is a program of loans and/or grants issued for the purpose of renovation of properties which are below standard. It is a once-only program, i.e. all necessary renovations must be covered by one application per property.

Application forms are available at the Rockwood Village and Township of Eramosa office, and are subject to approval by the township building inspector. In order to include water and sewer hookups these must be certified as below standard by the Health Unit.

Funds for this program are limited, and held by the clerk/treasurer Township of Eramosa—and applications are processed in order of receipt—a promissory note or lien is mandatory.
