Closing policy

Education accepts a proposed school closure procedure, Palermo and Campbellville schools don't have long to live, according to Trustee Don Long.

Trustees got their first look at Director of Education Em Lavender's proposed policy Thursday. The policy would see annual enrolment reviews of small schools and study groups set up to see how teaching staff and other resources can best be used and public participation will be encouraged.

Lavender predicted as population continues to shift in Halton the board will face the question of closing small schools.

He said it was best to establish a policy now when no school closing is being considered, letting the public know yearly there are enrolment problems. He suggested it will ease the stress on everyone when at the end of a year the problems have not been solved, no solution is in sight, and the administration asks the board to consider closing the school.

When enrolment starts slipping below 100 in a small school the possibility of closure under the proposed policy would increase.

Trustee Bert Hinton described the building of new schools and closing of old ones as an expensive way to provide student accommoda-

He blamed middle schools for some of the enrolment problems stating middle school take children out of elementary schools.

He said he has seen this happen in Acton this year and this isn't consistent with the objective of keeping costs down and children in neighborhood schools.

Hinton said it is hard for any school to beat a small one in terms of education quality but the middle schools are going to force small schools to

"It's a travesty of justice," Hinton declared.

Trustee Ivan Armstrong said he supports the idea of yearly reviews with the community kept informed but was against enrolment guide-
