# New school set for 1979

Halton Board of Education approved plans Thursday to spend \$5,400,000 on a new high school in Milton to open in the fall of 1979.

Trustees approved a three year capital forecast and the funds for the new high school for 900 students, including 400 vocational, has been set aside for 1978.

The board has also set aside \$250,000 for three elementary

school sites in the proposed Timberlea and Valleyview neighbourhoods. The purchase of these sites in Milton is scheduled for 1978.

The addition of a general purpose room and conversion of the existing general purpose room into a library at Fairview school is slated for 1980. This project is expected to cost \$352,000.

# Teachers earn \$28,289

A study of 100 collective agreements between teachers and boards of education in Ontario indicate secondary school teachers will earn between \$8,748 and \$27,357 in the 1977-78 school year.

In the elementary schools the figures range from a low of \$8,748 to a high of \$27,508. Separate school teachers earned between \$8,620 and \$28,289.

Of the 100 1977-1978 agreements available for examination, 25 per cent had a provision regarding a cost-of-living allowance. The summary of 1976-1977 agreements

noted that 27 per cent contained such a provision. Sixty-one per cent of the 1977-1978 agreements filed make provision for a monetary allowance for a teacher holding a Master's degree. The amount of this allowance ranged from \$100 to \$760.

Ninety-two of the 100 1977-1978 agreements provided for at least 75 per cent subsidization of OHIP while 78 provided 75 per cent or more subsidization of an extended health care plan. Dental plans were provided for in 79 per cent of the agreements with 50 agreements providing 75 - 100 per cent premium

subsidy. In terms of long-term disability plans, 57 per cent of the agreements contained provision for such a benefit with 22 agreements providing no subsidization and another 25 ranging between 75 per cent and 100 per cent.

Of the 100 agreements, 30 make provision for a pupil-teacher ratio while 20 deal with the matter of class size.

## Bell to up rural service

Milton Council heard of Bell Canada's plans to improve its rural phone service.

By the first week of December rural customers with eight or ten lines will have four party line service. The program will cost \$495,000.

Customers will also pay more for the improved service.

A charge of 40 cents more a month will be laid on party line customers.

Individual or two-party line clients will pay a mileage rate increase up to 50 per cent up to \$1.05.

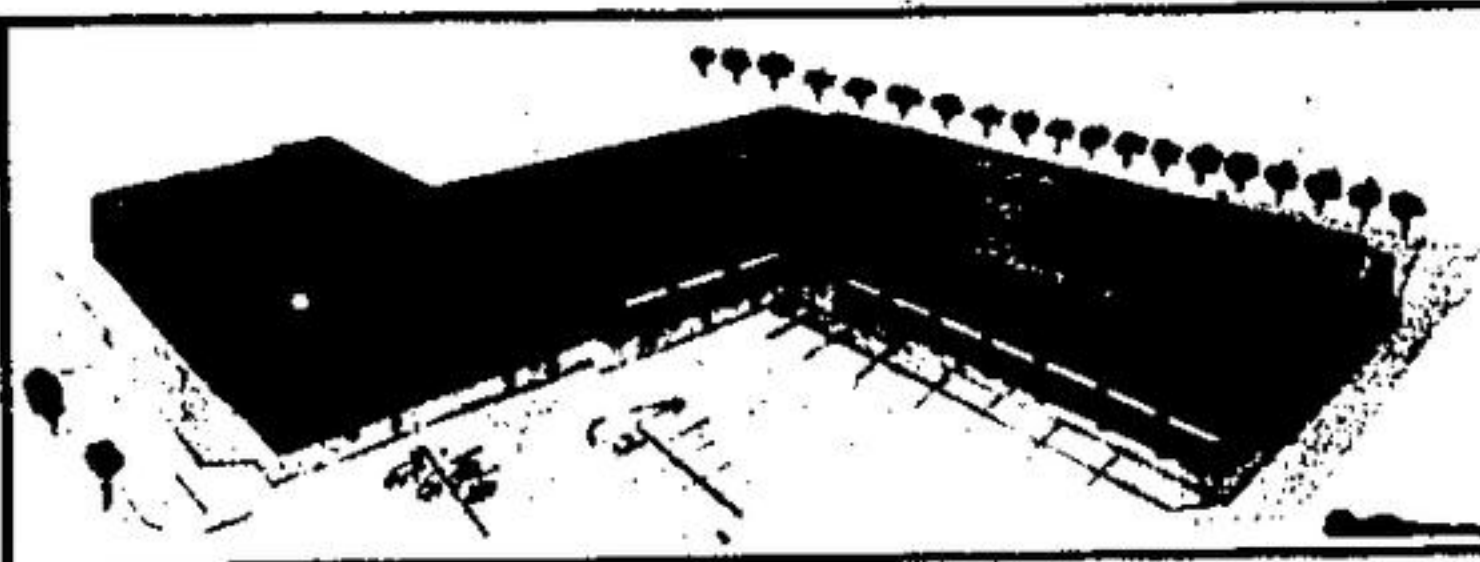
