He must judge the speed and the distance the puck is to travel to determine the "lead" required and the speed of the pass. The target will not be the receiver's skates, but a point ahead of his stick. Have practise, first passers standing still, then on the move, to place the puck so that the receivers will not have to break stride to receive it. It is better to have receive it. It is better to have a bit too much lead than to put the puck into the receiver's skates or behind him. It is well to practise picking up passes with the feet. The receiver trails the skate

up ahead to his stick. Teach a flip pass for use when an opponent's stick is in position to intercept or to clear the puck against the boards into centre ice. It is especially good for pass-outs from behind the opponent's net. To make this pass, the wrists are used to lift the puck. There is no sweeping action, but rather the puck is flicked from in front of the plane of the body, with the blade of the stick lifting the bottom edge of the puck.

Knowing when, and when not to pass, is essential. The "blind" pass, made without looking for a receiver, causes many serious mistakes in a game, and usually results from not playing with the head up. Rather than risk a blind pass, a player should stickhandle for better posi-


