

Raiders plan to host Yugoslav Nats

The Yugoslavian National hockey team will pay a visit to Georgetown's Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena for a match against the OHA Intermediate "A" champion Georgetown Chrysler Raiders, Wednesday, February 15, as part of their nine-game tour of Eastern Canada, February 2-18.

The Yugoslavs, who competed in last year's "B" group world championships against East Germany, Poland, Japan, Norway, Hun-

gary, Holland, Austria and Switzerland, are preparing for this year's championships which take place in March.

They'll also face Junior "A" clubs from Quebec and the Ottawa area, St. Lawrence University of the U.S., the University of Western Ontario in London, the 1976 Canadian Intermediate champion Embrun Panthers and an all-star Junior "A" squad from the Maritimes. It's expected the Yugoslav

lineup will include some players who performed for that country's National Team against the Soviets, Czechs and Swedes in the 1972 Olympics at Sapporo, Japan. Six months later, the gold medalist Soviet team lost 4-3-1 to Team Canada in the most exciting hockey series ever played.

Raiders, currently second in the OHA Intermediate "A" standings, will add a total of five players to their roster from league rivals, Dundas

Merchants, Port Colborne Sailors, Thorold Athletics and Fort Erie Mavericks for the game. The player additions will be announced in January. The Georgetown club should provide formidable opposition for the touring Yugoslavs. Raiders have the nucleus of the outstanding lineup, which took them to the Eastern Canadian finals, last year.

Advance tickets for the game are on sale at Creative Camera in the Georgetown Market Centre or at Friday night Raider home games.

Raiders are selling tickets for the game at \$3 for adults and students and \$1.50 for children. There will be only 500, \$1.50 tickers for children sold, however. After they are gone, a child's ticket will cost \$3, as well.

The objective is to dispose of all tickets by advance sale. Raiders must meet a substantial gate guarantee in order to host the game and they don't feel their ticket prices are unreasonable. Standing room tickets for last week's international friendly between the Moscow Selects

and Hamilton Fincups in the Mountain Arena sold for \$8. A pair of tickets for the Raider Yugoslavia game would make an ideal Christmas gift.

Raiders are the first OHA Intermediate "A" team to ever host a touring European club. They applied for that opportunity more than a year ago and had their request granted when the Yugoslavs had an open date on this year's tour, which is being hosted by the Ottawa District Hockey Association. It'll be Georgetown's

second international hockey experience. Two years ago, a record crowd of 1587 jammed Alcott Arena to watch Georgetown Sunny Acres Farm midgets edge Vaasa, Finland, 4-3.

Two Georgetown boys will get a first hand look at the Yugoslavs before they arrive in town. Dean and Dick Popiel both play with the St. Lawrence U. varsity team. The Yugoslavs will travel to Georgetown from London where they'll play the UWO Mustangs, Monday, February 13.

What Milton Flyers need is muscle to back up their hockey talents. Once again, Streetsville Derbys pulled into town and rustled a win through intimidation.

The 12-6 victory was secured by means of frightening Flyers away from the puck and the play until Derbys had a clear ticket to walk in and score goals.

Once Streetsville has the opposition slowing down coming into the corners and looking over their shoulder, they have the game mastered.

Flyer coach Gerry Inglis and Vern Gooding believe the Flyers' lack of muscle is a going concern. Coach Inglis said "From the goal mouth out, we can be intimidated by Streetsville."

"When I played hockey I was tough and when I coached I usually had one player who could do the job." Inglis remembered his Georgetown team with Ken Robinson. He was a good tough player and Milton lost as soon as he stepped onto the ice.

"Against Streetsville I have five solid players who could be better than any regulars on any other Junior B club," Inglis said. About the rest of the Flyers, Inglis wondered if they were "timid".

After four games with Streetsville, Inglis assessed the losses as starting the game and being in the contest, either tied or ahead. He
