Council vetoes inquiry into livestock killing

Ther will be no inquiry by Halton Hills council into the ownership of dogs alleged to have killed sheep and poultry. Council voted against Monday night.

Council could hold such an inquiry under the Public Inquiries Act, and determine whether they could or could not establish the ownership of the dogs and apportion damages.

A letter from the town solicitor pointed out the council's decision is not binding on a court, if it went that far.

Councillor Mike Armstrong maintained council would be wasting their time and the time of the people involved council's decision means nothing in court.

Councillor Pat Patterson contended Minister Agriculture William Newman was urging municipalities to become more involved with the control of predators. He warned a dog getting into a purebred flock of sheep and killing 15 could cost the town \$15,000 to \$16,000.

Councillor George Maltby said at almost each meeting resolutions are passed to compensate someone for the loss of animals by dogs. He said the people who let their dogs run at large are not being charged, and as a result there is a hardship on the agricultural community. He urged the inquiry be held right in Halton Hills. He warned there would be many

more such cases. Councillor Pete Pomeroy agreed there would be more especially if council became involved in civil actions. "The lawyer says it won't hold water, anyway." He warned against coming people seeking

action against each other. "We'd just be opening up a can of worms," commented Councillor Roy Booth.
