# Assess regional plan

You are soon going to be asked to comment on the draft regional official plan—a document that will influence the kind of future the region will offer you and, by implication, what it won't offer.

For instance, since the document calls for the preservation of agriculture as a form of livelihood, large parts of Halton will retain their rural character and be relatively sparsely settled. This policy becomes visually dramatic when a map of the proposed future Halton Region is compared to that of the future neighboring region of Peel, which has taken a different tack. Peel will be highly industrialized and densely populated.

What the plan denies residents in the future, for example, is a network of super highways providing fast, congestion-free motoring.

The plan deals in policies. In this respect it is different from the more familiar land use type of plan people are accustomed to seeing. In the words of regional planner Rash Mohammed: "The plan does not deal with people's backyards; it deals with their life styles."

In an interview with this paper, regional planners Ed Cumming (director of regional planning), Rash Mohammed and Bob White discussed ways in which you can approach your study of the plan and evaluation of it. Planners want your comments on the document. "A good plan must be credible in the public's eye," said Mr. Mohammed. "This is not our plan; this is the public's plan."

When you are evaluating the plan, there are two kinds of concerns you should have, suggests Mr. Cumming. One is the specific effect the plan will have on you because of the geographic location of your residence. The second is the overall effect the plan will have on you because of the quality of life it proposes. In going over the plan you should ask whether it expresses your value systems, Mr. Cumming said.

"He (a Halton resident) should see if there's anything there that inhibits him," Mr. Cumming elaborated. "Does it protect him? Does it prevent him from doing what he wants? Does it reassure him there will be a lifestyle he can enjoy?"

Other areas you might examine are the growth directions, the balance between the number of jobs and residents, and the balance between "nature in the raw" and urban settlement, he advised.

In effect the planners said the way to approach the plan is to identify your values and philosophies concerning lifestyle and compare them with the policies outlined in the plan.

The plan, when approved in its final form, is a policy commitment for regional councillors to keep in mind in their everyday decision-making, Mr. Cumming said.

"It deals with processes that must be followed and criteria and guidelines to observe in making decisions," the planning director said. "It doesn't give you a specific answer to a land use question the way a zoning by-law does, but it does tell you what goes in to produce an answer."

If you want to read the plan for yourself, you will have to ask for a copy. Brochures will be mailed to each household announcing the plan and providing directions for obtaining a copy.

What you will get is a document divided into six parts. Part I is an introduction. Part II contains the goals and objectives that were developed as a result of consultation with the public and others in the summer and fall of 1976.

The goals are the ideal or the general direction toward which the region wants to move, explained Mr. Cumming. Objectives are more specific aims which contribute to the main goals. Together they speak to the

physical, economic and social development of the region to the year 2001.

The next section, Part III, contains the policies dictating goals. Steps to be taken in carrying out the policies are contained in Part V.

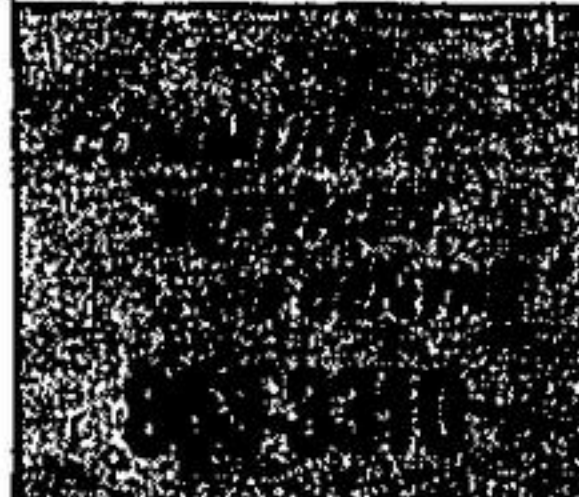
Part IV, labelled "The Regional Concept", discusses Halton's position within the Toronto-Centered Region, of which it is a part. Part VI defines the terms used throughout the document.

There are a number of maps scattered throughout the volume but regional planners have many more maps—larger and colored—which they're willing to share with interested members of the public. If you want to look at more-detailed maps or have questions about the plan, you're invited to call the

regional planning department, the planners said.

Public meetings will be scheduled at which you can discuss and comment on the plan. Staff would also appreciate receiving your comments in writing.

In addition to the public meetings, which will soon be announced, planners are willing to go out to talk with groups of people who want further elaboration on the plan, Mr. Mohammed said.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board pursuant to the provisions of Section 35 of The Planning Act for approval of by-law 77-79 passed on the 3rd day of October, 1977. A copy of the by-law is furnished herewith. A note giving an explanation of the purpose and effect of the by-law and stating the lands affected thereby is also furnished herewith. ANY PERSON INTERESTED MAY, within twenty-one (21) days after the date of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the clerk of the Town of Halton Hills notice of objection to approval of the said by-law or any part thereof and shall indicate that if a hearing is held the objector or an agent will attend at the hearing to state the objection.

ANY PERSON wishing to support the application for approval of the by-law may within twenty-one (21) days after the date of this notice send by registered mail or deliver to the clerk of the Town of Halton Hills notice of his support of approval of the said by-law together with a request for notice of any hearing that may be held giving also the name and address to which such notice should be given.

THE ONTARIO MUNICIPAL BOARD may approve of the said by-law but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law will be considered. Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection or notice of support and who have left with or delivered to the clerk undersigned, the address to which notice of hearing is to be sent.

THE LAST DATE FOR FILING OBJECTIONS will be January 13th, A.D. 1978.

## THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS BY-LAW NO. 77-79

A by-law to amend By-law 1358, as amended, of the former Town of Acton, now the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills.

WHEREAS the Council for the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills deems it necessary and advisable to amend By-law 1358, as amended,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- Schedule "A" to By-law 1358 is amended by changing the zone designation of those lands outlined on the plan attached to this by-law as Schedule "1" from R3 (Residential Third Density) to R3-1 (Residential Third Density Special).
- Notwithstanding any provisions of By-law 1358, as amended, to the contrary, the lands known as Lot 21, Registered Plan 98 in the Town of Halton Hills (formerly the Town of Acton), may be used for no purposes other than a two storey semi-detached dwelling in accordance with the site plan attached to this by-law as Schedule "2".
- This by-law shall take effect on the day it is passed by the Council of the Town of Halton Hills, subject to the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board.

### 100 years ago

Taken from the issue of the Free Press Thursday, December 27, 1877

About six o'clock last evening (Wednesday) an unknown man was found dead under a culvert on the townline between Nassagaweya and Esquesing. From facts that we can glean, we learn that he is supposed to be a tramp as he had been seen walking down the track past Crewson's Corners at dusk. He fell a distance of about 15 feet alighting on his head and when picked up, he was quite dead.

He is about 35 years of age with light brown whiskers and a moustache, dark hair, dressed rather ragged and is about five feet, five and a half inches high. He had in his pocket a paper entitled The Young Catholics, together with two combs, lens out of spectacles, two needles, pipe and small quantity of tobacco, a Catholic tract and a piece of cloth with which to mend his clothes. At the time of his death, it is supposed he was under the influence of liquor. The body was taken to Mr. Lang's residence near the scene of the accident where an inquest will be held today by Dr. Freeman of Georgetown.

## Keep records

A Halton parent thinks bus drivers should be required to keep records stating where and when a student leaves the bus.

Thursday Halton Board of Education received a letter from H.B. Johnson, RR 3 Campbellville, who urged students' names, the time they left the bus, where they left the bus and their destination should be recorded by drivers and passed onto parents.

He noted there were some problems during the December 5 blizzard with high school students leaving the bus and having to walk some distance home. Mr. Johnson and he had "no gloves or head protection." Trustee Bert Hinton said parents must accept responsibility for the way students are dressed.

"Bus drivers are instructed not to let students off the bus, but with the size and age of high school students this is impractical."

He urged drivers be required to take down pertinent information when a student leaves the bus before his stop and radio the information back to bus company officials who will telephone parents.

"In this way we will know the approximate location of students in a blizzard."
