As riding secretary Mrs. Duncan deals with the wide variety of calls made by constituents to the riding office located above the hardware store on the corner of Main and Martin Sts.

Mrs. Duncan described her job as primarily public relations. As she spoke it became evident she helps many people to sort their way through the confusion of policies and regulations that affect them.

The problems she hears most frequently have to do with workmen's compensation, unemployment insurance and old age pensions. "We get everything else too,

from land severance to school busses," she commented.

Sometimes the problem can be solved with a few phone calls by Mrs. Duncan, who has contacts in all the Alternately, callers are given names and numbers to make the contacts themselves. In either case the information they end up with is the same.

She provides a link to Mr. Reed, who is too busy in Queen's Park to be at his riding office every day. (The house is in session four days a week and sittings often run late into the evening.) 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
