

Raider game seventh stop on Yugoslavians' tour



RON WAPLES was named Horseman of the year by the Canadian Trotting Association.

The CAHA has announced the schedule of games for the Yugoslavian National Hockey team's nine stop tour of Canada next month.

Highlight of the tour, for Georgetown hockey fans, is the February 15 date when the Slavs will meet the OHA Intermediate "A" champion Georgetown Chrysler Raiders at Alcott Arena.

Raiders have already sold about 400 tickets for the big game, but there are still plenty of good seats available. Tickets may be purchased at the Creative Camera Shop in the Georgetown Market Centre or at Friday night Raider home games.

The Yugoslavian team, which is preparing for this year's "B" group world championships in March, arrives in Montreal Friday, February 3.

The tour will begin with two games against Tier 2 Junior "A" teams from Quebec, at Beauport, near Quebec City, Sunday afternoon, February 5 and at Thetford Mines in the Eastern Townships, Monday, February 6.

Wednesday, February 8, the Yugoslavian team will play Pembroke of the Central League (Tier 2 Junior "A") in Pembroke.

St. Lawrence University, a team with Georgetown minor hockey grads Dean and Dick Popiel in its lineup, will host the Yugoslavs at their rink in Canton, New York, Friday, February 10.

The Rockland Tier 2 Junior "A" club will provide the opposition for the Yugoslavs in Ottawa, Saturday, February 11.

The Yugoslavian team will travel to London to play the University of Western Ontario Mustangs, Monday, February 13, before coming to Georgetown to meet the Raiders, Wednesday, February 15. In between, the Yugoslavs will be special guests at Georgetown's Hockey Heritage Dinner, Tuesday, February 14.

When they leave Georgetown, the Yugoslavs will wind up their tour with two tough games back in the Ottawa area. They'll play the Hull Olympics of the Quebec Major Junior "A" League in Hull, Friday, February 17 and the 1976 Hardy Cup champion Embury Panthers in Embury, Saturday, February 18.

Tickets for the Hockey Heritage Dinner are on sale at Kenner's Dairy Bar.

Coaches' Corner

Minor Hockey Week in Canada was initiated to publicize the fact that it is alive and a very integral part of the framework of the total hockey picture.

We usually watched pro hockey on T.V. and junior and intermediate hockey, locally. Attendance in Georgetown at all hockey levels could and should be better.

Incorporated with Minor Hockey Week were slogans. One of the first was "Take, don't send your boy to the arena." Then Minor Hockey came out with a suffix to this motto that read "and stay to watch him play." If the originators of the suffix to the motto had known what to expect from parents attending their son's games, they might never have suggested it.

barassing to an eight to twelve-year-old boy to see his mother or father in a rage run down to the boards to berate an official or yell at his son's teammates to "kill him". This conduct does nothing to foster the aims and objectives of minor hockey. It is also the reason some people are considering banning parents from their son's games. After all, teachers do not have to tolerate interference from parents during class periods.

Parents Need Education

The conduct of parents is such an important issue that William McMurty's Report (Investigation and Inquiry into Violence in Amateur Hockey) recommend that an Ontario Hockey Council be established with one of its seven functions to be educating the parents and public about the role of amateur hockey. This recommendation has already been implemented and can be considered the first step in the educating process. The second step can be taken by parents by stopping and thinking about their own conduct at these games.

I received the following poem from a disturbed parent who felt that every parent should read it and give it very careful consideration.

You'll hear them at rink-side time and again. They scream and they shout, they rant and they roar. No wonder their poor boy's too nervous to score. It's a game for the memory and it's not really tough. Any parent can do it if you practice enough.

The rules are quite simple, the results are much better. If you will try to remember each rule by its letter:

Y—is for yelling, which you must not do with the exception of cheering, which we're coming to.

E—are emotions that embarrass the boy nor exactly make teammates just jump for joy.

K—is the kid who is trying to play. The program is his, to learn his own way.

C—is for cheering and in this way you show you have confidence in your boy, and just watch him go.

O—is for orders, which you never shout. Remember to leave these for the coach to dish out.

H—is for home, which is where you should stay if you hinder the kid when he comes out play.

So that is the game and there's one basic theme. Remember the motto when tempted to scream. Though we're not really trying to put you back on the shelf. "Parents need not wear glasses to make spectacle of self."

Helps Deserve Thanks

You and I have seen blatant examples of unruly conduct by parents at these games. Some have interfered with the referee, their son or the coach. They forget that being human, referees and linemen make mistakes and also, more importantly, they are giving their time to do a thankless job.

Parents sit behind their son's bench trying to coach him everytime he leaves the ice. They forget that the coach is there to explain things to their son. All in all, parents forget they should remain a spectator only.

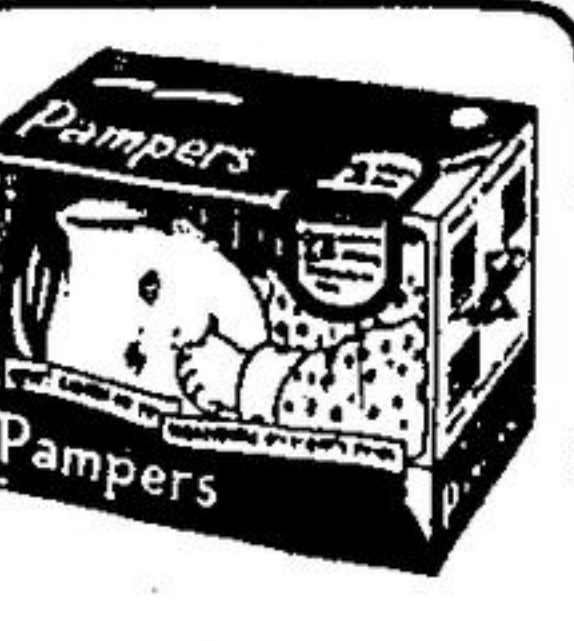
