Today you can order almost anything by mail—seeds, books, department store merchandise, body-building exercises and even "diplomas". Most mail order organizations are honest, but a small percentage are not—and give the entire industry a bad name. So before you deal with a mail order business, ask yourself:

- What does the offer really promise?
- Is the advertising actually informative?
- Do I know this company's reputation?
- Do I really need the article?
- Could I purchase the same article at a lower price locally?
- Can I pay c.o.d.? (cash on delivery)
- Is there a money-back guarantee?

Mail order gimmicks to guard against, along with a checklist to help you avoid problems when ordering goods, are spelled out in a new Information Bulletin from your Ontario Ministry of Consumer and Commercial Relations. The bulletin tells you where and how to check a company's reputation and outlines your rights under the Ontario Business Practices Act.
