

Peewees start play offs with pair of shutout wins

Acton minor peewees ended their Wellington-Waterloo season with a win and kept right on going in the playoffs with a pair of shutout wins over New Hamburg.

Their final win was a 3-2 thriller over Waterloo, which Coach Barry Insoe described as "a real good game."

Steve Dodson was first peewee to score for Acton as he got the puck from Bruce Sheppard and Jim Richards and fired it home. Lorenzo Civiero and Paul Cargill followed that by feeding Steve Raine for goal number two.

Civiero pulled the string himself for the winning point, getting the puck from Rick Dodds and Raine.

Dominated

Acton clearly dominated in both wins over New Hamburg. Rick Stull and Tim McKendry shared the net duties in both games and were unbeatable in the crease.

They took New Hamburg by a 4-0 count January 25 in the arena as Rick Dodds

scored twice to lead the way. He got assists on his first marker from Dave McKnight and Kevin McRae and on the second one from Sheppard.

Sheppard was the only scorer the peewees needed in the shutout when he broke through from Dodson and Cargill for the peewees' first point.

Jim Richards completed the scoring from Cargill.

The second win, by a 7-0 count, came Sunday in New Hamburg. Dave Milne had a fine offensive game, assisting

on four of the seven points. Dave McKnight was the only peewee to score twice in the game.

Other Acton goals went to Dodds, Sheppard, Civiero, Bruce Canary and Richards. Assists went to Sheppard, McRae, Richards, Cargill, Dodds and Brad Youmans.

The centres on the team, McRae, Civiero and Sheppard, did a great job of forechecking which kept the New Hamburg attack off balance according to Insoe.

Next game of the best of five series is tonight in the arena at 7 p.m. Insoe hopes to wrap it up then but says "You never know. We might take them too lightly."

If they get by New Hamburg, the grapevine has it their next opponents will be Woodstock, Insoe told the Free Press.

Gems tied for spot Tost blasts referee

Georgetown Gemini and Brampton Chevys are tied for the sixth and final playoff spot in the OHA Central Junior "B" League with only two weeks remaining in the regular season.

Gems moved into a tie for sixth with the Chevys when they tied the second place Dixie Bees 5-5 at Alcott Arena Saturday night after losing 4-2 to the Milton Flyers in Milton Friday night. Brampton, meanwhile, lost 4-3 to the Streetsville Derbys in Brampton Sunday night.

Georgetown manager Bob Tost is sure the Gems could be a point ahead of the Chevys in the race for sixth if referee Wendell Brown of Brampton had given them a fair shake in Saturday night's game.

"The first Dixie goal still hasn't gone in," said Tost. "The puck hit the crossbar,

dropped straight down and Brad (Miller) grabbed it before it crossed the line."

"Brown didn't even make an effort to ask the goal judge for his opinion," Tost continued. "I can't understand it. They won't even start a game if you don't have goal judges and yet a guy stands down there behind the net for three periods and freezes. Even if he'd ask the goal judge (Norm Lockhurst in this case), then made up his own mind later, but he'll ask a linesman who's standing out at the blue line, not even near the net, first."

Tost also blamed referee Brown for inconsistent calls which left his team short-handed at crucial times.

"He called faceoff interference against Chris Milne in the first period and John Krasnokousky for a faceoff violation (too many men in the circle) in the third," said Tost. "Then when we were playing two men short one time, Doug Barnes had the feet cut right out from underneath him after he'd ragged the puck for about 30 seconds. Nothing was called."

Brown has officiated in three of the Gems' last six games. Tost thinks that's a little unfair and intends to register a complaint with the OHA through league co-convenor Larry Robertson.

Following Sunday's game against the Gems, Brampton closes out its schedule against Streetsville and Milton.

Gems could clinch a playoff spot by picking up seven of a possible 12 points in their six remaining games. That six includes last night's tussle at Streetsville.

Juvs top Fergus, on to New Hamburg
