#### Hydro continues ICG preps for battle negotiators will begin calling

out newsletters to property owners along the route of the proposed 500 kilovolt transmission corridor from Bradley to Milton, to inform them of progress in negotiations and construction.

The corridor is divided into three sections: Bradley to Colbeck, Colbeck to Limehouse, and Limehouse to Milton.

the first section, Bradley to Colbeck, Hydro says six crews have now completed work on 218 tower foundations. Weather permitting, it is expected 44 towers will be erected this month, bringing the total completed to 127. Conductor stringing at the 230 kV crossings on both sides of


