Life suspension

Jim McLean was told by the president of the Milton Minor Hockey Association Monday night that the Ontario Minor Hockey Association has decided to ratify the MMHA recommendation and suspend him for life.

The life suspension was administered at an OMHA executive meeting over the weekend. McLean was at a hearing in Toronto last Tuesday before the OMHA. The Milton MHA recommended a suspension in a letter to the OMHA.

McLean was manager of the Trafalgar Ford Thunderbird major peewees Tri-County rep team. On Monday morning, Vern McCallum of the OMHA told The Champion simply that the OMHA "ratified Milton's recommendation they made in their letter."

McLean was suspended by the MMHA president, Joseph McCann after MMHA learned about the action McLean took during an exhibition game in New Dundee in early December against a Kitchener team.

Manager McLean had an uncared player sign and play under another youth's name in the exhibition game. McLean was also a member of the MMHA executive at that time.

The McLean suspension by the OMHA can be appealed after five years.

In an earlier interview with The Champion, after McLean found he was initially suspended by the MMHA, McLean said he "foolishly put in another kid's name" and admitted to having the boy sign that name.

When he learned of the OMHA finding, McLean said he had nothing to add at the time.
