Yugoslavs break even in first two games

The Yugoslavian National hockey team broke even in the first two games of its tour of Canada.

The visitors came from behind a 3-0 deficit to beat the Tier 2 Junior "A" club in Beauport, near Quebec City 6-4, Sunday afternoon.
However, Monday night, they lost 6-1 to the powerful Theford Mines Tier 2 Junior "A", team which has already clinched first place in its league.

Jean-Marc Lalonde, president of the Ottawa and District Hockey Association which is host for the Yugoslavian team's tour, reports that the team is very young.
The Yugoslavs were temporarily stuck in the snow near Sherbrooke yesterday (Tuesday), but were scheduled to arrive in Ottawa in time to meet the Tier 2 Junior "A" Pembroke Lumber Kings, in Pembroke

tonight (Wednesday).

They'll also play St. Lawrence U.S. with Georgetown's Popiel brothers Dick and Dean, Friday, and the Rockland Tier 2 Junior "A" club, Saturday, before coming to Georgetown for next Tuesday's Hockey Heritage Dinner.
The Yugoslavs were to play at the University of Western Ontario, Monday, February 13, but that game has been cancelled.

There are still tickets available for the Hockey Heritage Dinner and the game between the Yugoslavs and Georgetown Chrysler Raiders at Alcott Arena, the following night. There's a good chance the game will be aired by delayed broadcast on radio stations CHWO, Oakville and CHIC, Brampton.
Boston Bruin's leading scorer Terry O'Reilly, a native of Niagara Falls, will be the guest speaker at the

Hockey Heritage Dinner.

Also on hand will be international hockey expert Aggie Kukolowicz, who interprets for Alan Eagleson, the NHL, and WHA in international hockey negotiations, NHL officials John McCauley and Ron Finn, who both live in Georgetown and NHL Hall of Famer Pierre Plote, a resident of the area.

NHL referee Bryan Lewis, a Georgetown minor hockey grad, will not be able to attend because he must work a game in Pittsburgh the same night. Mike Forbes, a local grad who started the season with the Bruins but is now playing in Rochester, will also attend if his schedule permits.

O'Reilly, who played for the Prince of Wales Conference all-star game at Buffalo has 15 goals and 33 assists in his first 42 games this year. He's often referred to as the heart of the Boston club.

Suggest the plazas hire security: Morrow

The suggestion that plazas hire their own security forces rather than relying on police was floated during the Halton Police Commission meeting at Oakville Thursday.

"It's pretty expensive and we're gonna be nailed for favoritism sooner or later," Region Chairman Ric Morrow told commissioners.

The suggestion was prompted by the discussion of a 22-page report concerning vandalism in the Skyway Plaza at Burlington.

"It's bad, I don't know what we can do about it," commissioner Harry Barrett said.

Asks explanation of \$50 towing charge

The owner of a towing business who charged a Hornby woman \$50 to tow her car a short distance has been asked to appear at the next meeting of the Halton Police Commission to explain the charge. The towing business is under contract with Halton Regional Police.

In a letter to the commission, Phyllis Robinson of 5592 Trafalgar Road, Hornby, said she phoned Trafalgar Texaco on Dundas St. E. shortly after 6 p.m. January 9 and asked them to tow her car to their garage. The car broke down on Trafalgar Road, south of the Lower Base Line.

The garage subsequently phoned her back to say they could not get the car out

because the road was too icy, and they were afraid of an accident. The driver of the tow truck phoned Halton Police who agreed the car should be left where it was until morning.

However, at about 11:45 that night the car was brought into Trafalgar Texaco by Bob's Towing of Oakville, apparently authorized by police because it was in the way of snow removal.

Robinson said Trafalgar Texaco paid a bill on her behalf of \$50. In her letter she says, "In talking to police, Bob's Towing and Trafalgar Texaco, I have had no satisfaction as to why I have an exorbitant bill to pay." She asked for a written report from the commission.

No appeal

Halton Regional Police Commission decided last week against appealing the county court acquittal given Sgt. Jason Field on a charge of using excessive force.

County court judge Stanton Hogg last month erased the conviction of the Georgetown sergeant on the grounds that Halton Police Chief Ken Skerrett misinterpreted evidence during the December 9 hearing.

Field was convicted by the police chief during a hearing at Oakville which was conducted under the rules of the Ontario Police Act.

The conviction was in connection with an incident last May involving Gary Sparling.
