Yugoslavs hope history will repeat

The Yugoslavian National hockey team arrived in Canada, February 3, for its nine game exhibition tour hoping history will repeat itself. The Yugoslavs have never won a "B" group world championship, but their best showing, a silver medal at the "B" group world tournament in their home city of Ljubljana in 1974, came just two months after they completed a successful tour of Eastern Canada in which they won

five games, lost three and tied one.

Yugoslavia will once again host the "B" group world championships in its capital city, Belgrade, this March 17-26. The nine game Canadian tour is a preparation for those championships.

One of the three Yugoslavian losses interestingly enough, came at the hands of the intermediate "A" Embrun Panthers. Panthers, whose power-packed lineup included several top Major Junior "A" grads, nosed out the Ralders two games to one in a thrilling Hardy Cup playoff series the same year and went to the Canadian finals where they eventually lost to the Warroad, Minnesota Lakers. The Embrun club, which won the Hardy Cup in 1976, has also edged out the Ralders in three games in the '72-'73 season.

West Germany's giant Erich Kuhnhackl, a prospect coveted by NHL scouts. Alan Hagsleben, who is now a regular with the New England Whalers, league leaders in the WHA, was named best defenceman in the tourney.

Best forward was Gorazd Hiti, who led the tournament in scoring with 11 goals and four assists in seven games. Hiti was good enough to have been offered a tryout by the Chicago Black Hawks in the previous season, 1973. He attended the Hawks' training camp but suffered a severe eye injury when he was struck by a shot from Hawks' defenceman Bill White.

Neither of the Hiti's, nor Knez, are listed on the Yugoslavian roster for the present nine game tour of Canada, but familiar names like Futerle, Savic, Beravs and Smolej are.

"They're good skaters," recalls former CAHA director Al Davis "and they're not afraid to hit. They'll send their forward into your end to forecheck and, on offence, you have to watch them playing the puck out from behind your net." Davis travelled with the Yugoslavs on their 1974 Canadian tour and also attended the "B" group world championships in Ljubljana.
