Acton library looseleaf



Do you feel like a rip-roaring argument to blast away those old winter blues? There's a heap of ammo in A Cold New Look At The Criminal Mind by Michael Serrill in Psychology Today, a new magazine at the library. Serrill reviews some of the findings of a 16-year study on criminal behavior conducted first by D.C. Yochelson, a neuropsychiatrist, who started the program at St. Elizabeths Hospital in Washington, D.C. He began his work with criminal patients in 1961, and was joined in 1970 by clinical psychologist Stanton Samenow.

After studying the personalities of 240 men, spending hundreds of hours with many of them, the two researchers conclude that "habitual criminals are neither mentally ill or victims of circumstances. They have delusions and deviant thinking patterns that are present at an early age—and they deserve little sympathy."

This is one of the most startling conclusions in the two-volume study called The Criminal Personality, which to undertake it is shaking up the experts in psychiatric and correctional circles. Apologists and other earnest types who have been claiming for years that criminals are victims of environment or mental illness are tearing their hair over controversial assertions in The Criminal Personality.

Yochelson who did the bulk of the research, died in 1976. Working with an estimated quarter of a million pages of notes compiled by his colleague, Samenow put the book together. Serrill's article is worth reading for Canadians, in the light of current unrest among prisoners, their guards—and correctional bureaucrats.

In the same (February) issue of Psychology Today an article The Myth of the Vulnerable Child offers some comfort to parents plagued with guilt complexes over their offspring's behavior. Author Ariene Skolnick claims "anxious parents should relax. Despite what psychologists have been telling them for years, they do not have a make-or-break power over a child's development."

School board hires transportation officer

Less than a month after rejecting hiring of a transportation officer, Halton Board of Education did a flip-flop on the issue Thursday, deciding to hire someone to supervise school busing as soon as possible.

When the \$20,000 a year job was rejected last month because of a tie vote, bus operators review committee chairman Cam Jackson of Burlington vowed to bring the item back.

Thursday, when introducing the motion that a transportation officer be hired he said he thought all trustees were behind the spirit of the motion but the addition of another staffer was the problem.

Jackson stated school busing should be safe, accessible and efficient. He said the board should be looking for best value for the tax dollar and a transportation officer would fill the bill.

A real need for a transportation officer was conveyed clearly to the busing committee by the board's administration, Jackson added.

It could be more costly for the board not to have a transportation officer than to hire one," Jackson declared.

According to Trustee Bert Hinton parents think there are better ways to spend \$20,000 to improve busing service than on a transportation officer.

Hinton warned trustees they would be hearing from parents this year on more substantial busing problems than hiring a transportation officer.

Trustee Elaine Rhien noted senior administrators are currently doing their own jobs and trying to keep an eye on busing at the same time so assistance is needed in that area especially since the Superintendent of Business and Finance Bruce Lindley is retiring in 1979.

Trustee Ivan Armstrong suggested there is more busing in his rural Milton wards than in any other part of Halton and he thinks a transportation officer is needed. He said it would be a full time job keeping on top of busing.

Finance committee chairman Fred Armitage said there is a need for someone to supervise busing but he thinks someone from the existing staff can do it rather than adding another person to the board's payroll.

Trustee Len Crosier suggested the board's fleet of transportation officer for the entire region. The board runs a small fleet of its own buses in Oakville while busing is contracted out in Halton Hills, Milton and Burlington.

Jackson said he didn't think that would work too well since a fleet officer would still be needed. He added the board had a transportation officer until 1972 when the man who held the post retired.

Noting the board spends over \$2 million a year on busing and has busy administrators each doing a little bit of the supervision job, Trustee John Bradley, Halton Hills and Milton separate school representative, said "it is about time" the board hired a new transportation officer.

Trustee Florence Meares said as long as high ranking administrators are handling busing the board isn't getting its money's worth.

Hinton said the board should get out of the busing business altogether. He thought the administration should study means of solving busing problems between now and June.

School board hikes mileage

Despite vocal objections by some trustees, Halton Board of Education approved a mileage allowance hike for employees Thursday.

In December trustees turned down a mileage hike for 1978 but agreed to take another look at the issue at budget time.

While the proposed budget won't be presented until next month the finance committee brought in a recommendation for a mileage rate increase which is identical to the December recommendation.

Last year's mileage allowance was 21 cents for the first 5,000 miles and 15 cents for each mile after.

The increase which takes effect February 1 is for 22 cents a mile for the first 5,000 miles and 16 cents a mile for each mile afterwards. The monthly allowance for itinerant teachers goes up to \$28 from \$26.50.

The board's finance department estimates the mileage hike will cost nearly \$150,000 or 5.25 per cent more than mileage cost last year but at the same time costs of operating a car have increased between six and seven per cent in the past year.

Finance committee chairman Fred Armitage noted the board has a large number of employees who use their own cars for board business and

Trustee Bill Priestner predicted increased pressure on busing since many new areas are springing up and the board won't be able to build new schools. More busing will be the only answer, he claimed.

He said the board is going to have to improve its busing operation and he didn't see much problem in hiring a transportation officer since busing is run on a "shoe-string".

Trustee Florence Meares said as long as high ranking administrators are handling busing the board isn't getting its money's worth.

Hinton said the board should get out of the busing business altogether. He thought the administration should study means of solving busing problems between now and June.

"In the face of increasing costs it is only fair this be presented now so it can be raised."

He noted the increase is within 1978 budget guidelines and he considers the increase "acceptable."

Trustee Bill Priestner said he was opposed because the public sector should never lead the private sector in such an easily comparable way. He said the private sector mileage rate in Halton would be below the boards.

Trustee Bert Hinton said he couldn't support the hike when the Hamilton school board is at 18 cents a mile and the province at 20 cents a mile.

He said the board should encourage its employees to drive smaller, gas saving cars and hunt around for bargains when purchasing fuel.

Hinton said the mileage rate increase shouldn't be approved before the 1978 budget and noted "the board is ahead of everyone now on this rate without going up higher."

Armitage countered that with the differentiated rate the average mileage rate is 19 cents.

Hinton and Priestner were joined by Trustee Len Atger and Don Long in opposing the hike.
