Train wreck blocks tracks

A five car derailment at 6.05 Friday morning, blocked both tracks and blocked GO trains in Georgetown station. The freight train, with three diesels hauling 97 coaches was on a run from the marshalling yards at Highway 7 and Keele Street to Windsor, when the accident occurred.

Five cars were derailed, with three lying toppled on their side and two upright but off the track. Three of the derailed cars contained machinery and lumber and two cars were empty.

Lumber was strewn all over the tracks and the side of the embankment just a quarter of a mile east of the station, under the Maple Avenue bridge.

At nine in the morning a crane was brought to the scene and track clearing was started. The south track was cleared by noon, and the north track by 3.30 p.m. But lumber around the sides of the track was not cleared until midnight.

INFORMATION:

- Times** - Registration will begin at 8:45 a.m. in all schools. Necessary afternoon sessions will begin at 1:00 p.m.
- Tax Support** - Evidence of Public School Tax Support will be required. This information is shown on your 1978 tax bill. Please bring copy of your tax bill on the day of registration. If you do not have a tax bill, special forms will be on hand for completion.
- Age** - The child must be 5 years of age by December 31, 1978, to be eligible for enrolment for September, 1978.
- A birth certificate or notice of birth registration will be required for proof of age.
- Parents who wish to enrol their children in French Immersion Kindergarten classes will enrol them at their home school at the same time as the regular Kindergarten registration.
- The Principals will contact the parents to schedule a registration time. If you have not heard a week ahead of the day scheduled for your school, please call the school principal.
