NEC unveils escarpment plan

Proposed policies released by the Niagara Escarpment Commission last week designated the vast majority of North Halton escarpment lands as forest lands and mix-

ed agriculture. The proposals were presented to representatives of 55 municipalities Tuesday morning and later to a press conference that afternoon. NEC chairman

McMullin explained the proposals would now go to municipal councils and eventually to the public for more input. He suggested it would probably be two years before the plan could be recommended for acceptance by the minister. The moster plan was to have been completed by the end of 1976.

The overall plan covers land use designations for fire hall outline a 522-mile optimum route for the Bruce trail running from Queenston to Tobermory. The commission has said landowners would be consulted on the final route for the trail.

Chairman McMullin said almost 40 per cent of the proposed route is already in public ownership. The draft plan calls for eventual owner-



Crime in North Halton jumps

Crime in North Halton jumped again last year, rising 17.6 per cent over 1976, figures released by Halton Regional Police this week

revealed. Between 1975 and 1976 crimes rose 11.7 per cent in the north but part of the jump was blamed on the regional police expanding its jurisdiction late in 1975 to include Acton and Esquesing. Part of last year's increase in crime can be blamed on the regional police covering Nassagaweya Township for the first time.

The number of actual crimes and "quasi" crimes investigated in the north swelled from 3,687 in 1976 to 4,333 last year, Superintendent Floyd Schwantz reported. Last year police conducted 191 investigations which were later classified as unfounded.

The police crime solved rate slipped for the third year in a row in the north the statistics revealed. In 1975 police in the north solved 60 per cent of its cases but by 1977 that figure has plummeted to 49 per cent. The 1976 case clearance rate was 51

ALL day." Last year police closed the books on 1,396 cases by laying charges and 725 by other means, such as warnings. A total of 1,434 adults and 88 juveniles were charged with criminal offences in the north

in 1977. One area where crimes went up drastically was burglaries which increased by close to 100 cases last year from 1976 and police are concerned about this.

House break-ins leaped from 103 in 1976 to 161 last year while shop burglaries jumped from 134 to 166. Schwantz said he found

these figures particularily "disquieting" since at one time shop break-ins were far more prevalent than house burglaries. Now the figures are nearly identical indicating a person's home is no "off limits" to longer

Break-ins at schools. churches and other institutional buildings increased by seven cases from 50 in 1976. Inflation seems to have played a part in theft cases
