contracted by the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) to conduct a fact-finding mission

This is an unprecedented activity for the college.

A team of Sheridan experts from the Heavy Equipment School in Milton is spending about five weeks reviewing and researching heavy equipment operations in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania and Mombasa, Kenya.

According to Murphy, administrator at the Heavy Equipment School and program manager for the project, the mandate for the Sheridan group is to examine the ongoing activities as they relate to the harbor operations in the two countries.

More specifically, the team is examining if efficiency of utilization of the Canadian equipment, provided by CIDA to the East Africa Harbors

on Africa study trip The study includes all aspects of heavy equipment operations, equipment repair, repair and overhaul facilities, logistics support and stevedoring.

At the completion of the visit, a report will be submitted to CIDA outlining the information collected and recommendations.

The five-man team includes Sheridan College Dean of Community Services Don Hamilton, heavy equipment faculty George McDonald and Jack Smith, and Walter Culbertson, Director of Terminal Operations for the Toronto Harbor Commissioners, who left for Africa early in February.
