Sault Ste. Marie cop tourney

Second win in three years

Sault Ste. Marie, winners of 5-1, Preston wallopped the peewee house league tourney two years ago and 3-2 losers to Georgetown in last year's event, proved they have not lost their winning touch as they took home four wins and the championship trophy from the ninth annual tournament.
