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College Royal has long lively history

March 12, the University of Guelph will host the 54th annual College Royal. Every year the students themselves the week-long organize festivities which culminate in a weekend Open House during which the public is invited to visit the campus and watch the Guelph students in action.

In the late 1800's and early 1900's livestock shows were very popular in rural Ontario. As the site of an agricultural college and a veterinary college, Guelph offered a logical location for these shows. The Royal Winter Fair which is held annually in November in Toronto began as the Guelph Fat Stock Show and in 1912 moved to the Toronto loca-

Wade Toole, head of the Department of Field Husbandry at the Ont-Agricultural College encouraged these events. Lawrence Demaray, OAC '25 became president of the first College Royal. He was responsible for taking Professor Toole's idea and turning it into reality. An OAC team had attended an evaluation competition at another Fat Stock Show and had done rather poorly. In order to regain some pride it was felt that perhaps it was time to start their own show as Toole had encouraged them to do. By 1925 the students had organized their first College Royal which consisted of the livestock show and exhibits from the various clubs on campus. Professor Toole dled prematurely in 1928 but his work was enthusiastically continued.

In 1928 a square dance competition was added and it is, to this day, still one of the. most popular events during College Royal. By this time

invite the outside world to these activities by advertisements in newspapers. In 1934 speakers from all levels of industry and government were invited to Guelph to round out the day's activities.

Originally College Royal was held in January but in 1929 it was moved to March and has remained there.

During the early 1930's the students at MacDonald Institute joined the fun by contributions such as a salad making demonstration.

Major trophies which were awarded during these early years included the Wade Toole Memorial Trophy which was awarded annually to the campus group that provided the most educational exhibit. The Jacobine Jones trophy goes to the Grand Champion Showman of the livestock show. These awards are still given out each year.

Since the early days, College Royal has expanded from one day to ten days of

out actually helping. The final weekend is always hectic. On Friday night the annual Dog Show provides entertainment and this year the Fashion Show will also be held then.

Saturday, the first day of Open House weekend, is also the day during which the livestock show and the square dance competition occur. The Official Opening of College Royal takes place just after the Director's Luncheon. This year the guest of honor will be Lieutenant-Governor Pauline McGlbbon, who is also the Chancellor of the University of Guelph.

Students have been preparing for the coming College Royal for nearly a year and they are looking forward to inviting the public to visit the' campus during Open House weekend on March 11-12. 
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
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
