An arm or leg cannot work without the rest of the body, and the head ties everything together. That was the message of the Rev. E. DenHaan, campus minister of the University of Guelph, at the World Day of Prayer Service Friday, in Beth-El Christian Reformed Church.

The Rev. DenHaan explained that Jesus is the head of the church, and each member is like an appendage. All are very important, he said, but alone, they are useless. People, like the parts of the body, must be united, with a head, in order to function.

The theme for the overall service was Community Spirit in Modern Living. The purpose of the day according to the program is "Church women in Canada send with this service a message to those across the world who will be praying together on this day."

"Our life in Canada is becoming a fuller and richer one as people of many cultures, many races, many

creeds and many tongues have come to make their home here. As Canadians, we call our brothers and sisters around the world to share their lives with us and with one another so that all humanity may grow into unity and wholeness through fellowship with one another. And in doing, we are doing God's will."

Today's recipe

A hot dish for a cold day, from the Synchro Swim Team cook book.

Stuffed Green Peppers
3 large green peppers
½ lb. ground beef
1 c. dry bread crumbs or cracker crumbs
1 tsp. chopped onion
1 tsp. salt
¼ tsp. pepper
1-8 oz. can tomato sauce
Heat oven to 350 degrees. Cut thin slice from stem end of each green pepper. Remove all seeds and membranes. Wash. Heat 1 c. water and ½ tsp. salt to boiling. Add peppers, cook 5 min. and drain.
Mix remaining ingredients. Lightly stuff each pepper with 1/3 of the meat mixture. Stand peppers upright in ungreased baking dish. Cover and bake 45 min. Uncover and bake another 15 min. 3 servings.
