## Houston runs in top twenty

Frank Houston, the Acton runner competing in the Canadian track and field championships Sunday in Montreal, was a little disappointed by his performance but still managed to finish in the top 20 in the 3000 meter race.  
Exact positions and times were not available because the group he was with had to leave right away, but Houston told the Free Press he ran about an 8:33 to finish between sixteenth and eighteenth.  
"The track was not as fast as the track at the C.N.E.," he said. "Most people's times were a little off. Mine was more than a little." His best time this season was an 8:21.0 set last week at a tune-up meet.  
He felt he just did not have the competitive edge. "I went out steady. My 800 was 2:14 and my 1600 was 4:28. Then I lost it and fell back."  
The race marked the virtual end of the indoor track season. Houston will run a few short races around 800

meters but must start preparing for the summer season soon.  
Talking about the Montreal arena complex he said "They had quite a complex. There was a 50 metre pool, diving, basketball. It puts Toronto to shame." He was running in the Claude Robillard Centre.

Acton major atoms recovered from a 4-3 home loss Saturday as they came back with a 4-2 win over Paris to take a 2-1 lead in their best of five OMHA semi-final playoff series last night in the arena.

Hudson led the scoring in last night's game as he potted three markers.

Paris took an early lead in the first period but Hudson evened the count from Grant Smith and put Acton in front from Bruce Raine before the period ended.

The winner came early in the second period when Tony Van Dam fed Hudson for his third of the night. Paris

proved they were not out of it yet as they came back to make it 3-2, but Terry Danagher iced the game from Sandy Waites after two minutes in the final frame. The defence, which was good all game, held on to get the win.

"Jamie Lawson was the outstanding player," according to coach Bob Faseruk. Faseruk also praised the defence for their effort and said "we're really looking forward to Friday night" when they face Paris in the fourth game of the series.

An overtime goal by Raine from Hudson gave Acton a 4-3 win in overtime the first game, played in Paris. A goal by Paris in the last minute of play forced the extra period.

Hudson was the first marksman of the game, scoring on a solo effort seven minutes into the game. Two Paris points gave the home team a lead when the period ended.  
Hudson tied it up with his second unassisted score in the second period and Raine connected in the third period from Hudson and David Thomas to give Acton the lead again.  
Coach Bob Faseruk credited the outstanding goalkeeping of Steven Taillefer. "He played great during the overtime period, making key stops in the last minute." Faseruk also praised defenceman David Thomas for his pokechecking and body checks.  
"The whole team played one of their better games of the season. Everybody did their thing when they were called upon.  
Acton took a 3-1 lead half-way through the third period in the two teams' second

encounter but stopped skating in the last few minutes to allow Paris to catch up and get a 4-3 win.  
Hudson scored once in the first and once in the second to build a two goal margin. Van

Paris scored once to end the second period at 2-1.
