"I can be more objective now," Mr. Sharp smiled on hearing his introduction, "but not less a Liberal!"

Board rejects prayers for unity

Acton-Esquesing Trustee Bert Hinton found no support at Halton Board of Education Thursday for his plan to have Halton pupils pray for national unity.

He asked the board to consider following the example set by Hastings-Prince Edward Separate School Board and have students read a prayer, written in English and French, once a week. He noted the Eastern Ontario board has 4,000 pupils reciting the prayer weekly.

"In view of the groping that goes on with regard to the importance of concern for Canadian unity, it would seem that a prayer is perhaps the most constructive resource available as a cure to our problems," Hinton's prepared statement to the board sald.

Earlier, he said he thought his prayer plan made more sense than most dealing with national unity which have come to the board such as having students write letters to Quebec Premier Rene Levesque, protesting his plan to take Quebec out of Canada. Trustees didn't debate Hinton's plan before rejecting it.
