

Halton Board of Education held a minute's silence in memory of Howard Wrigglesworth School teacher Jim Pell who died last Thursday. Teachers at the school paid tribute to Mr. Pell whom

Vote secret

Results of a vote by separate school teachers in Halton, who were asked to allow their negotiators to apply for a formal strike vote, have been withheld. Negotiations have been

dragging along since last spring and on March 14 almost all of Halton's 354 separate teachers turned out to vote on whether a formal strike vote should be taken. If there is a teacher strike it won't be until mid-April at the earliest.

Chief teacher negotiator Bob Boyle said the strike vote is being withheld on the advice of provincially appointed mediator. The mediator, Toronto lawyer Jane Devlin, didn't know the result of the vote when she gave the advice, Boyle claimed.

With negotiations back on again, Boyle said it was agreed the vote result should be kept secret so it couldn't be viewed as a club over the board's head.


