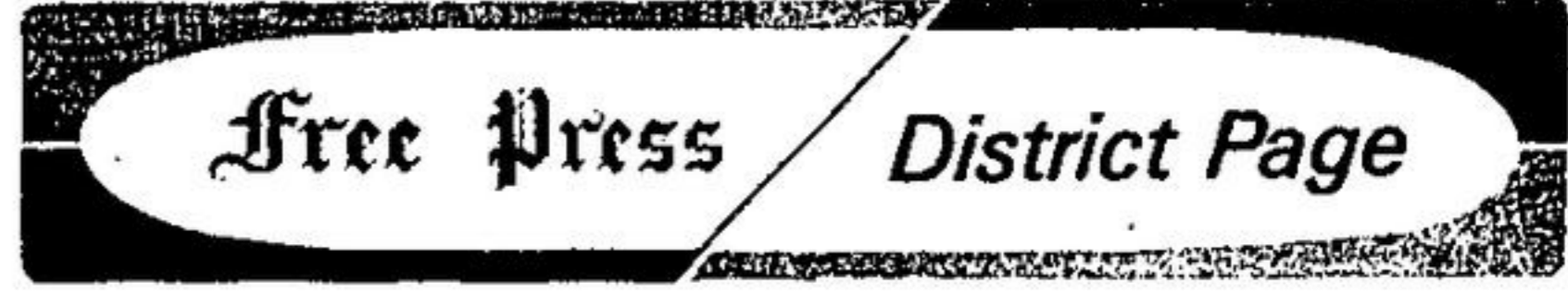
We desperately need someone to be our new Brown Owl for next September. If we can't get someone the 1st Limehouse Brownie pack will
