Two bant teams drop from tournament

Acton teams have been eliminated from the annual Georgetown International Bantam Hockey Tournament, although both gave a good account of themselves and drew plaudits from Georgetown fans.

The major bantams ousted Bay Ridges 7-6 in overtime in the first round, Monday, but were shunted to the sidelines, yesterday (Tuesday) 9-5 by Huntsville. They were entered in the tournament's "C" series.

Acton minor bantams, called in as a last minute replacement for East Gwillimbury in the "D" series, pushed Bolton to the limit before losing 8-6 in the first round, Monday.

As in other years the teams play two games, with the total goals score counting. The major bantams dropped the first game of their series with Bay Ridges 3-2, but rebounded to win the second 4-3, necessitating an overtime session for the round.

Gary Lumbers fired the winning goal in a second sudden death five minute overtime session. It was Lumbers' third goal of that game and his fifth in the total goals series against Bay Ridges. Derek Hodgson assisted on Lumbers' two goals in the first game.

Ronnie Jackson and Ray Mueller also scored for Acton in the second game. Hodgson and Mueller picked up two assists apiece. Acton trailed 3-1 in the second game and 6-3 in the series, before rallying to win.

David Anderson played an outstanding game in goal in both ends of the series.

Yesterday (Tuesday), the major bantams ran into the hot goaltending of Huntsville's Doug Wagg and were blanked 4-0 in the first game. They made a nice comeback to tie the fine Huntsville team 5-5 in

the second game, but dropped the total goals series 9-5.

Doug Voth and Brian Glashan netted two goals each for Huntsville in the 4-0 win. Wagg is the nephew of Acton resident Reta Rowsell, but he wasn't very friendly to Acton shooters. Huntsville qualified to Saturday morning's "C" series final with the win over Acton.

The minor bantams lost their first game 6-4 to Bolton, Saturday morning, then forced the more experienced Bolton major club to score in the final minute of play to

earn a 2-2 tie in the second game. Bolton won the total goals series 8-6.

Gordie McArthur, Rusty Elliott, Rob Vermeulen and Tim Ferguson were the Acton marksmen in the first game. Jeff Gill connected for both goals in the second game. Greg Morandi's last minute goal gave Bolton their tie.

Bolton was beaten 5-1 by Bradford in the first game of the next round, yesterday, (Tuesday).

The tournament continues all week with championships scheduled for Alcott Arena, Saturday.
