Commission criticizes staff

Halton Region Police Commission again took to task senior police staff members for going against commission policy on hiring, during a regular commission meeting Thursday at Oakville.

"This is embarrassing to the chief (Ken Skerrett) and a slap in the face to the commission," Commission Chairman William Hourigan said. "This type of conduct will not be tolerated," he continued.

The commission, the governing body of the police, took issue with the police placing job advertisements in newspapers. The commission's policy is to place such advertisements in local publications. Commissioners objected to the Toronto Star, Globe and Mail and the Hamilton Spectator getting the advertisements, plus the local papers.

The commission will question deputy-chief Fred Oliver, who placed the advertisements. Oliver was not at the meeting. "Maybe he (Oliver) should not be deputy chief of

the Halton Regional Police," Burlington commissioner David Coons said.

The police commission earlier this month reaped senior police staff because jobs were being filled without first being advertised. The commission decided to advertise for people and hold their applications on file for six months.

Halton Regional Chairman Ric Morrow determined there may have been a breakdown in communications between the deputy chief and the commission. He also asked that Oliver attend the meeting. "The gentleman should have a chance to respond," Morrow said.

Oliver could not be reached for comment Tuesday. The commission also talked about alleged irregularities concerning an application for a job at Burlington. Halton Police Association President Al Reulens told the commission a headquarters office worker who wished to make a lateral transfer to Burlington was harassed three times.

The headquarters worker, a woman, wanted to work in Burlington because she would be closer to her Hamilton home. Reulens said the woman was told she would have to apply for the job, then take a stress test. Why a stress test for someone who is already an employee Reulens asked the commission.

The woman was also told by a police officer that she might not be happy working in Burlington (District 3), Reulens said.

A part-time employee held the job at Burlington, someone, whom Reulens said, everyone feels is qualified. The woman, at headquarters, had been told by police staff she got the job at Burlington, Reulens told commissioners. Reulens later agreed with commissioners that letting the woman at headquarters change to the job at Burlington was in line with the contract.

Someone in the department is trying to circumvent the dictates of the commission,
