



The act of bravery must have been performed during the year ending September 30th, 1978, and nominations must be received by October 7th, 1978. The Award will be presented at the Ontario Trucking Association Convention to be held in Toronto in November, 1978.

The selected Hero will receive a personal trophy, a \$1,000 cash award, a V.I.P. all-expenses-paid-week-end for two in Toronto and an inscribed Rolex watch. Nominations, accompanied by a newspaper clipping,
