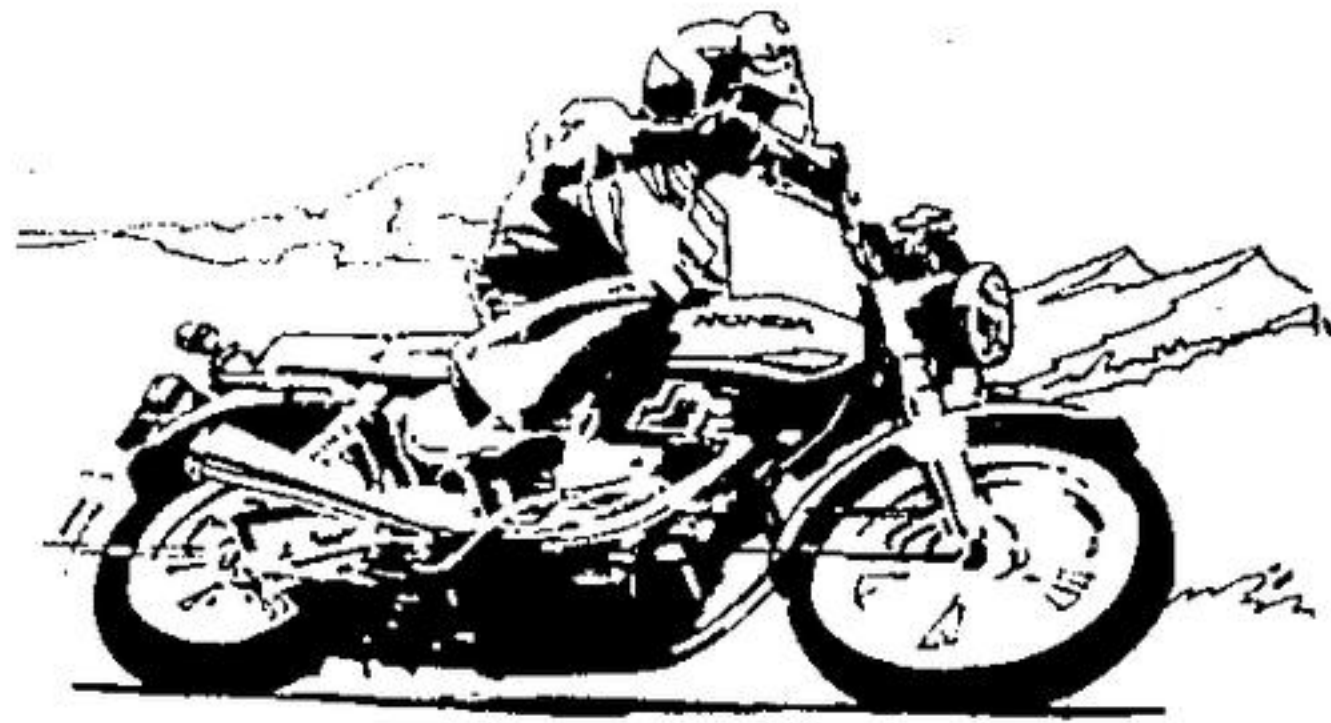

New town pumps a gas for police

Halton Regional Police will take advantage of Halton Hills new, tightly controlled gas pumps in the town's works yard on the Trafalgar Road.

Regional Police Commission decided to continue gassing up cruisers from Halton Hills facilities during its Thursday meeting at Oakville.

Halton Hills set up the system for its own vehicles and offered the police its advantages, such as a key for each vehicle, 24-hour service and monthly billing.

"It will save bookkeeping," Police Chief Ken Skerrett told the commission. He also said the system may be adopted throughout the region.

Police slice budget \$53,000

Halton Region's police budget has been trimmed to the wishes of the region's administration committee but there is no cut in the services to the public, according to commission chairman William Hourigan, Thursday at Oakville.

There is absolutely nothing that could be trimmed without hurting services to the public Hourigan said. The budget stands at about \$9,123,000 the chairman said. Oakville commissioner

Harry Barrett said the commission's commitment to the region to cut \$10,000 from the budget had been carried out. Add to that cut an error in the original and the total trim comes to about \$53,000.

All going well, it will not make a \$53,000 difference in service to the public, Hourigan said.

According to Barrett Halton's budget is the least expensive per capita of any regional force.

Police Ass'n. to table interim morale report

A Halton Regional Police Association (HRPA) special committee on morale will table an interim report at the association's meeting this week, according to the group's president.

HRPA president Al Ruelens said Thursday at Oakville

there are about 150 items for the association to check so far.

The association committee was formed last month to enquire into the causes of low morale on the force. About 80 officers unanimously passed a resolution to set up such a committee at a meeting in Trafalgar Hall on March 28.

The committee is formed of Ruelens and six HRPA directors.

Ruelens said last month the association has discussed the morale question before, but the HRPA never before set up a committee to study morale.
