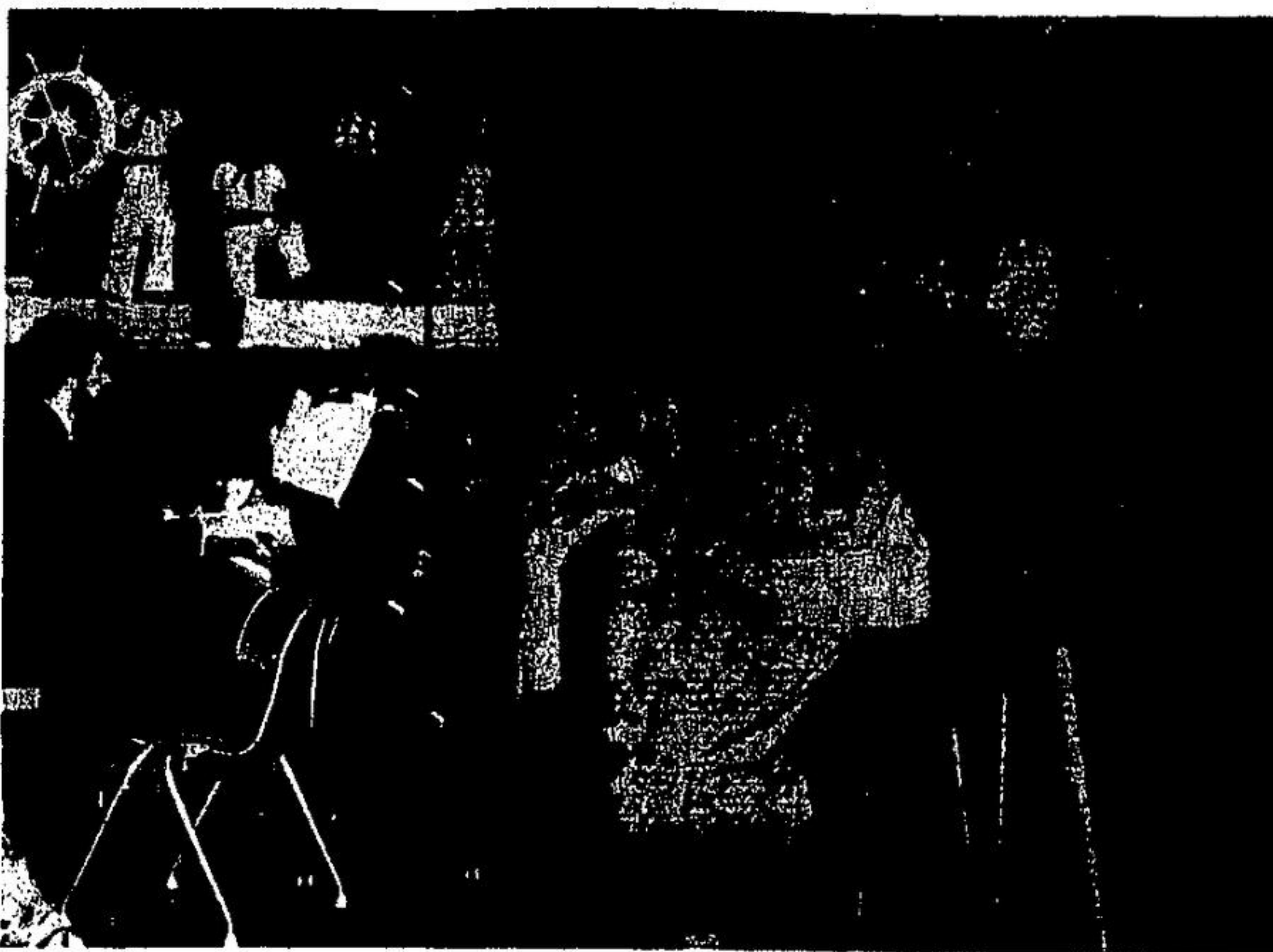


# Pinafore fills M-S school for two performances
