

Streetsville fails in bid to win OHA crown

Stratford Cullions have won The Sutherland Cup and OHA Junior "B" championship over the OHA Central Junior "B" group champion Streetsville Derbys for the second year in a row. Cullions copped their second straight Cup when they downed the Derbys 5-3 in Streetsville, Sunday afternoon, to win the eight point OHA final series 9-5. Last year, Stratford dropped the first two games of the finals to Streetsville then swept the next four matches. Derbys' failure to perform on home ice was a major factor in the Stratford championship win. Cullions gained two wins and a tie in four tries at The Vic Johnston Arena. The series opener ended in a 4-4 tie and the final was tied at three points apiece after Stratford won the second game 8-4 but the Derbys destroyed them 10-0 in the third game. Stratford moved in front with a 6-3 win in their rink and took a 7-3 lead when they dropped the Derbys 7-3 in Streetsville, last Tuesday night. Facing elimination, even on a tie, Derbys broke a 4-4 tie at the end of the second period to win Friday night's sixth game 7-5 in Stratford. Georgetown's Terry Turner scored Streetsville goals in the fifth and seventh games. Larry Robertson, convener of the Central League, said he's never seen a more disciplined Junior "B" team than Stratford. Stratford players saluted the flag when they lined up on the blue line for the playing of O Canada before the games and during the games, they stuck to hockey, leaving fights to the two players who started them. A major weapon in coach Jack Nairn's arsenal was an umbrella offence employed in the Streetsville end of the rink in power play situations. Nairn used three players along the blue line and two near the net, relying on his charge to pass the puck around until Streetsville defenders were lured out of position. Stratford ousted Elmira, Waterloo, Barrie and Oshawa on their way to the finals. Streetsville blanked Georgetown Gemini and Milton Flyers four straight in the first two rounds, speared by St. Catharines in seven games in the OHA quarter-finals, then whitewashed Windsor four straight in the semi-finals. Derbys, rumor has it, spent close to \$50,000 to try to avenge last year's loss to Stratford and win the OHA championship. At least half a dozen Derbys have previous Major "A" or Tier 2 "A" junior experience. The Stratford club, on the other hand, had the same number of midgets in their lineup. It's the third time in the last four years that the Central League has sent a team to the OHA finals. In the 1974-75 season Oakville Blades led Bramalea Blues 3-1 in the best of seven OHA final, but Blues bounced back to win the next three games and the OHA championship.

Fitness medal awards for Brookville pupils

More than 200 students participated in Brookville Public School's Canada Fitness Day competition Wednesday, April 26, with medals going to most of the competing students. The program developed by the federal government in 1967 as the Centennial Awards program had grades six, seven and eight students running, jumping and doing sit-ups, as the school's students attempted to capture medals in the six divisions. "We certainly have improved since last year," remarked Jim McHugh, boys' physical education teacher following the afternoon's competition. Approximately 30 students captured awards of excellence—the top prize for their abilities in the different activities. Approximately 70 more students will receive gold medals, with the same number to acquire silver medals and 35 students to receive bronze medals. "The interest in the program has seen a general improvement in fitness," continued Mr. McHugh, adding that girls have shown a particular improvement in the competition standings. He stated he found the government developed program "valuable" in developing the abilities of students in a variety of sports, such as basketball. Students spend about five to six minutes each gym session on warm-up exercises incorporating the fitness program.

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
