## Halton Needs A Strong Voice In Ottawa

# JELINEK DELIVERS!

Halton riding is one of the most important in Canada. Because of its population of success-oriented people, Halton has one of the highest per capita incomes in Canada. The riding contains some of Canada's largest industries — The Ford automobile and truck plants, two huge oil refineries, manufacturers of tank cars, trucks — as well as literally hundreds of successful small businesses and productive farms.

Despite its importance, Halton has been virtually unheard from in Ottawa for the past four years. Otto Jelinek wants to change that.

Otto Jelinek has been a worker and a fighter ever since he was first elected to parliament in 1972. He has kept up a constant barrage of questions and private member's bills designed to force the Liberal government into action.

One of Otto Jelinek's first tasks when he arrived in Ottawa was to draft a policy on amateur sport and fitness for the Conservative party. The task was a natural. Otto and his sister Maria were the team that brought Canada one of its most proud moments in international sport.

Otto Jelinek worked hard and long to develop a rational sports policy for the Conservatives. When it was introduced, the Liberals jeered, and continued to jeer . . . until they adopted the policy almost in its entirety.

More recently, Otto Jelinek has served as a spokesman for the Conservative party on small business. Through committees and meetings with small businessmen across the country and around the world, he has developed firm policies on what small business needs. These policies have been adopted as the official Conservative platform and will be put into effect when the Conservatives form the next government of Canada.

In addition to being the official opposition

spokesman on small business Otto Jelinek has

— Served as vice-chairman of the committee on industry trade and commerce;

— has been the opposition critic on the Olympic games.

— is a member of the Canadian Inter-Parliamentary group; and

— is a director of the Canadian Ethnic Heritage Foundation.

## Halton Riding Needs Otto Jelinek



A native of Prague, Czechoslovakia, Otto Jelinek came to Canada with his parents when he was six years old. His family established a business in Oakville with Otto attending Blakelock and Appleby College in town.

After he and his sister won the world pairs figure skating championship in 1962 Otto Jelinek returned to Oakville and established his own business, Canadian Skate Industries. He operated the business for the next five years, building sales of \$2,000,000 per year and a staff of more than 100.

In 1972, Otto Jelinek was asked by the Progressive Conservatives to contest the Toronto riding of High Park. He won, defeating the sitting Liberal member, and held his seat in the 1974 election, one of two Toronto members to do so.

Shortly after that election, he married the attractive Leata Bennett of Lake Louise, Alberta. He and Leata split their time between his job in Ottawa and their home in Oakville.
