Landslide Support For A P.C. Riding

The largest nomination convention in the history of Halton gave Otto Jelinek a first ballot victory in his bid to represent the Halton Progressive Conservatives in the next general election.

Despite a driving rain, an estimated 2,500 Tories parked as far as ten blocks away to attend the meeting. They crowded the main gymnasium of Blakelock High School, the two-level cafeteria, a smaller gymnasium and three classrooms.

Otto Jelinek defeated Dr. Arthur Ross and Tris Lett to win the nomination after a vigorous fight for votes.

Election officers handed out 2119 ballots for the election and 2106 ballots were cast.

Three weeks before the nomination meeting membership in the Halton P.C. Association had grown-from less than 500 members to more than 3500 and association executives began looking for a bigger hall to hold the meeting.

"We found that there wasn't a big enough building in the riding to hold all the Tories," President Dorothy Chamberlain told the jam-packed high school.

Two of the candidates. Otto Jelinek and Tris Lett, had downtown Oakville store front offices with squads of volunteers phoning members.

Each candidate had signs and other paraphernalia at the nomination meeting and buttons, hats and Tshirts were worn to support favorite candidates.


Despite stiff competition, candidates and their workers have remained good friends, dedicated to electing a Progressive Conservative member for Halton.
