Gravel tenders opened

Gravel tenders were opened at Eramosa council meeting on May 15. Deputy Reeve Henry Holman had declared conflict of interest and left the council chambers for the tenders' discussion and decision.

From the three tenders received council chose MANN Construction as this year's supplier of the maintenance gravel at \$1.94 per cubic yard and the construction gravel at \$1.91 per cubic yard. Council has decided to purchase more or less than 10,000 cubic yards of maintenance gravel and more of less 5,000 cubic yards of construction gravel.

These requirements and tender are subject to approval or refusal by the

Ministry of Transportation and Communications. Tenders will be returned to the unsuccessful bidders.

Consultants write council

Some 25 per cent of questionnaires about the Rockwood Secondary Planning sent out to householders in Rockwood have been returned, according to planning consultants Marshall Macklin and Monaghan.

In a letter to Eramosa township council this week, the consultants explained that the survey was not meant to be the only source of input from village and area residents. It was stated that

there were three objectives of the survey: to provide attitudes; to use as an information source; and to provide an informed base of discussion.

At a previous council meeting village trustees had drawn to council's attention the fact that one question on the survey was misleading. They were also disappointed the questionnaire was not sent out to township residents also.

The consultant's letter said the survey was just to gather hard facts and not opinions. It also pointed out there will be public meetings and open houses for all township residents to attend.

As for the misleading part of the questionnaire, the letter said, the vast majority of people seemed to understand what the question meant.

The consultants suggested June 7 as a date for an open house in Rockwood town hall. Council approved this date.

Council also agreed that there will be no random survey of rural residents as they had previously suggested to the consultants. They also agreed the meeting should be advertised in local newspapers as well as householder mail.

Wasting electricity is a hot issue.

Appliances that heat things up can use a lot of electricity. Here are some tips on how to cut down.

Watch out for the elements! Choose the element that best fits the pan. A lid on the pan also keeps heat from escaping.

Load it in your favour. Wait until you have a full load before you wash. And remember, much of your laundry will get just as clean in cold water. Afterwards, hang your clothes outdoors to dry.

Give your dishes the air. You'll save electricity with your dishwasher if you cancel the final dry cycle. Just open the door and let your dishes air dry.

Electricity down the drain. A dripping hot tap can waste 175 gallons of hot water a month. A new tap washer costs only a few pennies.

Don't sneak a peek. Don't open the oven door unless you have to. And don't use an oven full of heat for one small item.

Don't join the tub club. A shower usually takes less hot water than a bath.
