Council concern for child services

Alarmed that the province, without consulting the region, is going to dump all the responsibility for area children's services in the region's lap, the community and social services committee is making moves to improve communications with the province concerning the issue.

The committee wants the region to be designated the official point of liaison with the Ministry of Community and Social Services concerning children's services as

they apply to the region. In addition committee members want Ministry officials to meet with them to explain the Ministry's intentions.

Committee Chairman Walter Mulkeewich said he was concerned that the Ministry has never officially communicated to Regional Council the changes it plans.

Once scattered under several administrations, most children's services in the province were brought together under the Ministry

of Community and Social Services in July 1977. The Ministry has also been talking about the establishment of local bodies composed of representatives of various segments of the community to administer services to children.

In a report to the commit-

tee chief administrative officer Ernie Reid said the province has advanced the notion that local governments should have the ultimate responsibility for funding. At the same time the Ministry proposes the services be administered by the local children's services committees.

Funeral service was at St. James Church, Dundas, Tuesday with interment in St. John's cemetery, Ancaster.

Equipped with an updated rotary engine, the car is able to speed along at 120 miles per hour. It can accelerate to 60 miles an hour in nine seconds or less. The Mazda RX-7 is competing with the Porsche 924 (\$16,000), the Datsun 280-Z (\$3345) and Chevrolet's Corvette (\$11,257). With prices starting in the \$8,000 range, the RX-7 is going to give the other brands a run for its money.

The long front of the car offers the sporty look, while the entire glass hatchback makes for excellent visibility. Inside, there is no back seat, but enough roominess for luggage for two people, five bags of groceries or golf clubs.

For the performance promised, dealers agree the RX-7 is a real value and bargain.
