

# Big Brothers try again to establish in Halton Hills

Big Brothers is trying once again to become established in this area.

After several falling previous attempts a group of 10 Halton Hills men have spent over six months organizing Halton Hills Big Brothers.

President George Wagner noted in an interview this week Big Brothers has never really gotten off the ground in the past here but the effort that has gone into organizing this attempt assures a good chance of success.

He said the board of directors is looking for both Little Brothers and Big Brothers.

Halton Hills Big Brothers is now incorporated and will soon be registered as a Canadian charitable organization. Big Brothers is a national organization with 135 branches across Canada.

"The premise of big brothering is to provide friendship and guidance to fatherless boys by a big brother on a one-to-one basis.

"The increasing need for Big Brothers across Canada is in direct relation to the great numbers of single parent families as a result of changing attitudes in our society. As separation and divorce rates skyrocket, more and more boys between the ages of six to 18 find themselves without a father or a male figure in their lives for modelling and identification.

"There are today 5,500 men who are Big Brothers mat-

ched with a little brother. Statistically there are an additional 14,500 men across Canada who possess the characteristics, the willingness and the time to become Big Brothers."

Halton Hills Big Brothers hope a national recruitment program Canada Big Brothers is running next month will help get the ball rolling for the local group.

A national publicity and fund raising campaign will be conducted with a major event being a St. John's Newfoundland to Ottawa and Victoria, British Columbia, to Ottawa bazaar run. The runners will come through Halton Hills June 11.

Wagner said he hopes local people and school children will join the runners for the

jog through Halton Hills to help raise money for the local chapter.

He said they already have a list of 10 Little Brothers to be matched with Big Brothers and "that's just the tip of the iceberg here".

Wagner pointed out a number of Halton Hills Big Brothers' directors are teachers and they "know there is a big need here".

He noted application forms are ready for both Big and Little Brothers. Wagner said it takes about three months to match a big and Little Brother and all matches are followed up to ensure they are working.

# Student job program begins

For the eighth consecutive year the Credit Valley Conservation Authority is running a student summer program. Formerly Project S.W.E.E.P., Program 1801 is one part of Experience '78, the name given collectively to all student programs administered by the Ontario Provincial Government's Youth Secretariat. The purpose of the program is to supply meaningful employment for students undertaking work projects above and beyond that which the normal Authority staff can accomplish during the summer months.

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority has accepted 34 of the 135 applications received from both high school and university students for periods of 6-18 weeks. A total budget of \$45,000.00, considerably less than previous years, has been approved by the Ministry. The students have been

divided into four work crews. One crew will be stationed at Terra Cotta Conservation Area for the duration of the summer, while the other three crews will be working throughout the watershed on various labor projects.

Proposed projects include: construction of a wood shelter, creative playgrounds and outdoor ski racks; extension & improvements of the cross-country ski trails at Terra Cotta Conservation Area; development of educational nature trails at Silver Creek Conservation Area.

# Police ask help

Halton Regional Police are asking the help of residents in controlling the misuse of trail and mini-bikes. District One Superintendent Floyd Schwantz this week issued a three page memo to supervisors and platoon leaders asking them to ensure, that when officers have time, they patrol areas where the motorized bikes are used.

"We have received reports from all divisions in the district, relative to the misuse of mini or trail bikes, on residential streets, and in parks, and playgrounds and also on private properties," states the memo.

In addition to patrols, Superintendent Schwantz is asking his men to record names and addresses of malefactors.

Police will patrol entrances and exits from bike areas. They will also be asking neighbors to co-operate and phone police. Officers will resort to the courts, if necessary.

drinks, dancing and a special ice cream cake in honor of the occasion.

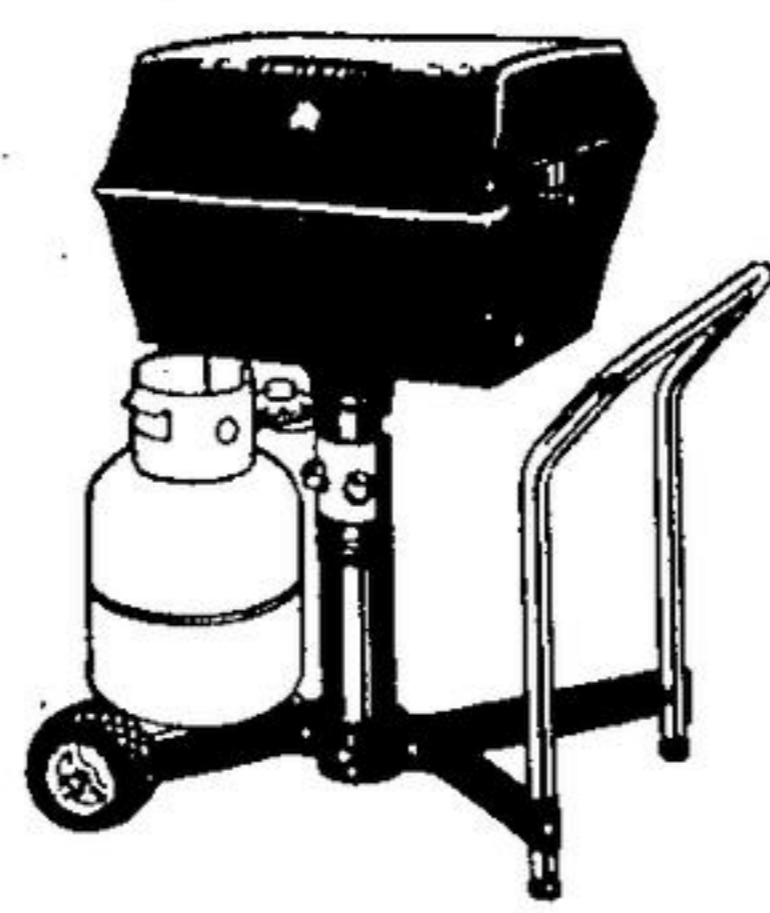

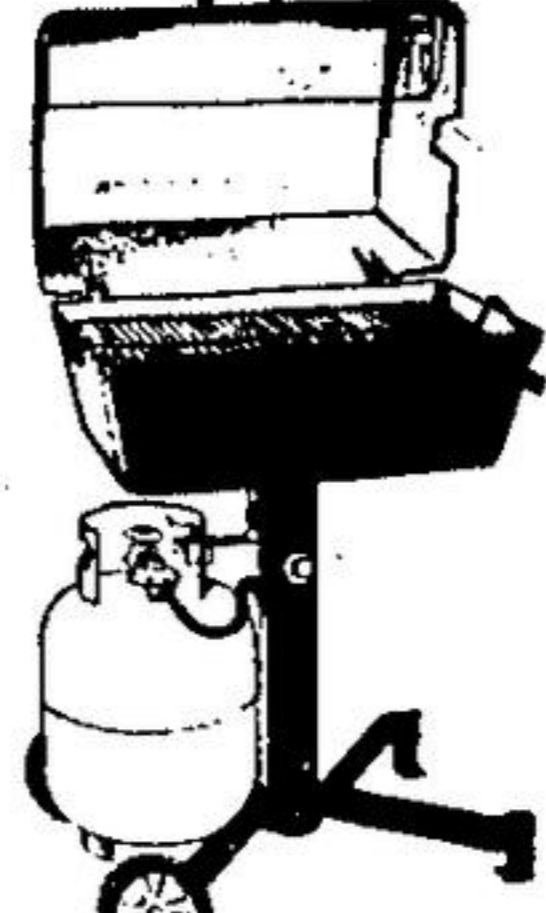
