## Society sees slides of 900 year old tapestry

The Arts and Crafts of Georgetown held their May meeting at the home of Nellie Beatty in Acton, with a record attendance of 34 out of a possible 43 members present.

Photographs of the quilt named "Exquisite Knots" were shown. The quilt being made by members of the group, in double-bed sized, has pink roses with green leaves on a white background and will be raffled at the Oct. 14 sale and display at the North Halton Golf Club. Members were pleased to know their display area space at the golf club has been doubled this year, allowing for many more demonstrations of crafts and for the re-introduction of demonstrating guest artists.

For those people who were disappointed last year at finding the parking lots full, there will be twice as much space available which should alleviate the problem entirely.

A highlight of the afternoon social hour was an ice cake, complete with candles to celebrate the recent 50th birthday of Jen Thompson who is a charter member of the Arts and Crafts of Georgetown and who has missed only two meetings since the group's inception in 1942.

The guest speaker was one of the group's own members, Audrey Deere, who gave an illustrated talk on the Bayeux Tapestry which she had visited last fall. In its temperature controlled, glass-encased viewing room in the Cathedral town of Bayeux, Normandy, France.

The tapestry is actually a piece of embroidered linen cloth measuring 230 ft. by 19 inches and portraying in design, the historical events leading up to, and the actual battle, for the conquest of England, by William, Duke of Normandy, in 1066.

It has never been completely made the tapestry, but it is known to have been in existence since 1077, only 11 years after the battle of Hastings, when it was first displayed by being hung since the pillars of the nave of Bayeux Cathedral, on its day of consecration.

Even after 900 years, the colors of the wool threads of the embroidery remain glowing and vibrant and throughout its length, it reveals an accurate description of the dress, tools and implements and transportation of the times.

Mrs. Deere was thanked for her presentation by Mrs. Jessie Gyle. Members enjoyed refreshments served by Del Howe, Florence Wilkins Charlotte Ironside and Melanija Bray while tea was poured by Ruby Nielsen.
