Police week message received by students

Working Together to Prevent Crime, this year's Police week theme, was heard loud and clear by Acton area school students last week. Beginning Monday, Police Constable Bob Andrews visited

Speyside and Limehouse schools where he spoke to the students in an informal discussion. Speyside principal, Norm Howell felt that students tend to think of the Police as a formal, uniformed

group rather than people. Visits like this expose a whole new side of the police to the pupils.

On Wednesday, Constable Andrews' time was divided between Robert Little and St. Joseph's school. Question and answer periods in each classroom took up most of his time. However the Constable was still able to take part in the health hustle routine at Robert Little. One of the highlights of the visit to Robert Little and St. Joseph's was a visit by safety officer Constable Swaminathan and the "talking police cruiser."

Principal Gary Dawkins felt that the officer was able to relate to the students and so they spoke quite openly with him on Thursday at McKenzie-Smith. "Constable Andrews was more like a public relations person working with the students and creating a positive feeling between the two parties. The idea of Police Week is certainly a step in the right direction."

Discussions at the grade six to eight school ranged from the duties of the police and the role in today's society to the handling of obscene phone calls directed at girls in the Acton area.

Grade six students at McKenzie-Smith had recently been doing a community study and so information on the role of the police in the community fell right in line with their projects.

Students and staff at M.Z. Bennett enjoyed Constable Andrews' company for a full day on Friday. He was kept busy all day while visiting each class for a discussion with students. The kindergarten class was instructed in finger print identification and each had their finger print done.

A noon hour baseball game with the junior students and Constable Andrews challenging the teachers, demonstrated once again to students that police officers are human. Relating to the students on their level helped them to understand how important it is for the police and public to work together.

All the principals agreed that a positive and relaxed encounter between students and the police are important in developing their attitude towards the force. Students response to the police visit was reported to be outstanding.
